Editorial

In Table Tennis, as in other sports, we are surrounded by rules which govern the structure of the league. Many of these rules are necessary to ensure smooth running of the league and also as a guidance to all members. I feel it is safe to say that prior to the last A.G.M. we did not have any unnecessary rules which penalised members unfairly. Alas, since that meeting this is no longer the case. For an addition was made to Cup Regulation 7, following an incident last season. I felt then that this was a stupid addition which unfairly penalised multi-team clubs, and I have been proved correct, as members of Mossley Hill will willingly confirm. Those who sponsored this addition claimed it would have no effect on Cup matches until the semi-final stages at least. Try telling that to Mossley Hill!

It is often necessary for a player to move into a higher team due to sickness, etc., for a period of time, but still turning out in cup matches for his own team. Under this addition to Cup Regulation 7, any player doing this is barred after only six such matches from his own teams cup ties. The complete absurdity of this rule is exposed by the fact that if you play in a higher team and are subsequently demoted you are barred from cup matches for your new team, even if you are not cup-tied, if you played six or more matches as a higher

player. Just how silly and inane can we get?

It is every player's job to assist his club as a reserve whenever required provided he does not exceed his quota of 30 matches. That he should also be penalised by being barred from his team's cup games as well is certainly ridiculous.

I am sure that many clubs are unaware of the full implications of this rule, and feel that the sooner it is voted out the better it will be for everyone. Rules we must have, but it behoves us to see that they are sensible rules and not added to willy-nilly after every "little" incident!

WAKE UP, LADIES!

Are the ladies really interested in doing anything about improving the position in their division? It would appear not. I have not received a single letter on this subject and at a meeting arranged to discuss this matter with representatives from clubs with a team in the Women's division only two representatives, Joyce Randall and Elizabeth Loughrey, turned up. Could the real trouble lie in the fact that far too many women are getting regular matches in the mixed divisions and consider the Women's division should take second place? The outcome of this meeting was the arranging of extra matches but apparently no-one is interested in playing these as the Fixture Secretary has received no score cards to date!

Lancashire & Cheshire League

The Men's 1st team have won only I match from 5 played in Division 1 and are hanging around the bottom of the division. To ensure their keeping their status they must win two of the matches remaining, against Stockport and Blackpool at home and v. Preston away, but this is within their capacity and they should keep well clear of relegation. Strangely, during the same period they have won 4 cup matches and still figure in both the Wilmott Cup and Norman Cooke Trophy. In the Wilmott Cup we now meet Bolton on January 8th and in the Cooke Trophy we are away to Stockport on a date vet to be fixed.

We have not lost all these league matches due to bad play alone, for we've had quite a run of ill-luck also. Gordon Birch and Peter D'Arcy have both had to miss certain games for business reasons and Peter has had the added worry of having his wife in hospital. However, we hope that the results will improve during the last two months. The team against Bolton in the Cup will be Gordon Birch, Bruce Cain and George Smith. Pete D'Arcy will be away on business. Against Stockport the team selected is unchanged and this match will be played at Eng. Electric on January 25th.

Frank Bailey (YMCA) leaves Liverpool on January 14th to live in Swindon. This means that the 'A' team will need a replacement, and the team selected to do battle with Nelson on January 10th is Ted Mandaluff (YMCA), Trevor Owens (Wav. Lab.) and Roy Jones (YMCA). A formidable combination. To date this team has won 3 of the 4 matches played and this line-up is certainly no weaker than previously. Since Ted Mandaluff came into the side he has maintained an unbeaten record and we hope he will carry on in this fashion throughout the rest of the season.

The Ladies 1st team have played only one league match since the last 'Digest', beating Oldham 8-1 at home. Next they travelled to Manchester for the Zone final of the Rose Bowl, but their hopes were dashed by finding Susan Lisle of Warrington included in the Manchester team. This is quite legiti-

mate since Warrington do not enter a team in the Rose Bowl. But our girls were somewhat shattered to find such a strong combination playing for Manchester. Mabel Francis beat Mary Leigh again and won two of her sets, Barbara Cain won I and Joyce Randall none.

At this point I would like to pay tribute to Judy Crafter who retired from table tennis for the rest of the season after the Blackpool match. Since then she has become engaged and at present intends to get married next summer, after which she will live in Brighton. Her ability will be missed from our representative teams, of which she has been a mainstay for some years, and we can only wish her well in the future.

The Ladies 'A' team, composed of Janet Rumjahn, Jean Mackenzie and Pam Fidler, lost their only match since my last notes, v. Preston away, by 4 sets to 6. They also lost, playing as our Junior girls team v. Birmingham in the Bromfield Trophy 3 sets to 6. However the same trio will do duty for us v. Manchester Banks later on this month. Congratulations to Janet Rumjahn on her selection for Lancs. junior team v. Cumberland at Bolton on January 12th. May this be only the first of many future honours for her.

The Junior team also lost their only match during December at Warrington, 6-4. In addition they went out of the Carter Cup to Bolton, 6-3, in a game in which John Barton (Wav. Lab.) showed up well, winning two of his three sets. For the next few games Dave Crispin (Colonsay) will replace Alan Williams, his clubmate, and together John Barton and Michael Jones (Wav. Lab.) should form a strong trio.

The Youth team also feel the pinch at the loss of Frank Bailey, but a strong replacement is available in Dave Roberts (Wav. Lab.). The team has experienced very mixed fortunes over the first half of the season, and we hope for better things to come in the second half. For the next match v. Salford Youth, away, the team selected is Alan Dean (Linnets), Dave Roberts (Wav. Lab.) and Ian Wensley (Colonsay).

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Mainly about Brighton . . .

Nice to receive the "Digest" again. I particularly enjoy reading 'Net Cords.' Exactly the same type of happenings go on in my own league which just goes to show that table tennis is the same the whole world over. In the Leicester and District League we have twinstream divisions after the first. So do Wolverhampton. But beyond that I don't know of any more. At one time we used to have one Division I, two Divisions 2s, then four each in the third and fourth (A, B, C, D). We brought it down to two of each and that seems about right.

The English Open should provide a feast of table tennis this season. It will be on February 27th and 28th and March 1st. I don't imagine there will be a very big contingent from Liverpool going, but for anyone thinking of going, just look at the list of teams entering-Austria, Czechoslovakia, Netherlands, Federal Germany, Rumania, Sweden, Yugoslavia and Russia. With the four home counties also expected to compete this brings the list up to no less than thirteen countries. This is going to call for some pretty slick organisation to complete the programme in less than three full days, but knowing those responsible, I have no doubt at all the tournament will measure up to its usual success. Of all the tournaments I have been to I have never been to one which equals Brighton (where the English Open is held) for sheer enjoyment.

There was snow on the ground in 1965 when the English Open was held, but inside the Dome was white-hot with excitement. Two personalities stood out there. Marta Luzova, then a 17 year-old 'unknown' was giving the crowd a tremendous treat of hitting against the dour Marie Alexandru and when the Czech girl won the joy of the crowd knew no bounds. For a table

tennis crowd to get so excited was in itself unusual. That they should be so excited about a Czech girl was quite remarkable. At these Finals, too, Eberhardt Scholer showed his worth. The attacking Rumanian, Giurguica was strongly fancied to retain his title, but the West German would have none of it. Defending magnificently, moving with grace and deceptive speed, he completely cut his opponent to pieces winning by scores of 8, 9 and 11. Scholer's temperament, sportsmanship, ability and general demeanour are admired wherever table tennis is played. Anyone seeing him at Brighton for the first time (should he be there, which I hope he will) will be in for a treat.

Probably the shock of the 1967 Championships was the defeat of Chester Barnes by the jovial Irishman, Jim Langan. On his day Langan is capable of beating almost anyone. On this occasion he won in three straight. Mary Wright's victory in the Ladies' Singles was another glorious achievement. In the Final she beat the Hungarian, Eva Koczian. The latter possesses a defence which matches with the best in the world, but on this occasion, Mary, hitting superbly down both wings, emerged a well-deserved victor. Last season's finals were not up to the usual standards, but one could not fail to be impressed by the sheer speed of which Gomoskov's backhand moralised Hungarian left-hander Peter Roszas. Earlier his Russian compatriot had fell to Les Haslam, a West Indian, who has now qualified (and been capped) for England.

Yes . . . Brighton truly provides many pleasant memories — I wonder what big names will fall this season, what shock wins we shall see. Because if it lives up to its reputation, shocks

there will be!

Schools Table Tennis

As secretary of the L'pool Schools' Table Tennis Assoc. I am writing this article to inform all readers of the "Digest" of our efforts. We are affiliated to the Lancs. Schools' Table Tennis Assoc. and in turn, to the English Schools' Assoc. We have three main aims: (i) to promote, encourage and improve table tennis in our schools; (ii) to organise competitions at all levels for schools; (iii) to establish table tennis in our schools as part of the school curriculum.

Firstly, however, we must convince the Headteachers of our schools of the value of the game, and unfortunately we have met with some reluctance and indifference. We tell them it is a game unaffected by our winter weather, and also a game in which everyone can participate. It is interesting to note that the youngsters who usually shine at table tennis are those who are below average in other sports. We have in my own school a boy who suffers from a bone disease, and who consequently cannot participate in strenuous physical games. Table tennis is the ideal game for him and he plays very well.

We have two divisions with eight teams in each, and very shortly we

shall be holding our first full-scale coaching session.

A good grounding in the Schools' League provides ample preparation for the Senior League—The Liverpool and District. Excellent juniors like Dave Crispin, Pam Fidler, Jean Mackenzie, Jean Lancaster, Chris Lavelle, Michael Iones, Philip Topping, and until quite recently, Alan Williams and Ian Shaw, play in both leagues. We are very lucky in having Les French and Brian Leeson amongst the staff of our schools for both are qualified coaches. My own school is the first in the city to enter a side in the Liverpool and District under the name of ESSEMMAY.

Prominent citizens in Liverpool are taking an interest in our efforts for they can see the benefits, both financial and otherwise, and last season one of the "Digest" advertisers, Jack Sharp Ltd., presented us with a League Trophy. This was won by New Heys Comprehensive and league members will be able to see this trophy should the Closed Championships take place there again this season as it will be on show.

With such a keen interest in table tennis and strong Associations in Liverpool, we must surely be on top of the country very soon.

The obvious result is that we have turned a profit of £22 into a loss of £14, and what should be equally obvious is that for the first time we have to pay out £30 for facilities at Dunlops. We have been most grateful for all the help Dunlops have given us in the past and indeed are still grateful for their continued support and it is only to be expected that we should make some contribution to them.

We increased our fees to bring in an extra f10 and we kept down all other expenses except prize money which increased by 46. This can be justified in the quality of the prizes for which this tournament is now becoming noted.

Overall it is a satisfactory result and the benefits accruing to table tennis

and the League are well worth the small loss.

Gordon Birch, who must surely be the best No. 3 in the league, beat both George Smith and Roy Jones fairly comfortably, and the comparative ease with which he did it must certainly have enhanced his claims to a higher Bruce Cain had a double position! victory over Ted Mandaluff (two straight) and Peter Turtle (16 in the 3rd), and Eddie Clein lost to Roy Jones and beat Peter Turtle, both in two straight.

I was wrong in my choice of prospective champions apparently, almost everyone has hastened to tell me that the title is destined for Knotty Ash. It seems that after the first few matches they imported a top-liner, good enough for a No. 1 but to play at No. 3. So, if you all say so, I stand corrected and acknowledge your choice—Knotty Ash for champions.

It is queer the way some clubs go,

ambition and the will to win often appears to take over the running of clubs. Bohemians was one, the stars came, success came, but what went? Was it club spirit? Or was it just a chance that the laws of the club were changed restricting membership to full club members only? English Electric took over the role of "star" collectors and are riding high. To me, English Electric, the old Eng. Elec., starts in the 'A' team, but of course there are considerable advantages to be gained from having these top-liners in the club with the benefit of coaching down the line. Thinking of these things aloud the other day I heard the suggestions once again, "Why not a 1st division just for the experts?" Four up and four down is no good I am told and yet very few would give up the chance of a crack in Division I even for one season. I would like to see a separate 1st division for quite another reason. I believe the best table tennis team is one of four players, with two singles and a game of doubles for all, this has constantly been opposed in the past by experts who were worried about the lack of space in some clubrooms.

The Hyde Cup promises to be one of the most interesting competitions for sometime, we in Div. 3A like to eliminate our top challengers for the championships, helps to spread the honours True to tradition we have around. lost Knotty Ash, Bath St. and Sefton, in addition to last season's winners, Waterloo Park. We have Cadwa 'A and Liverpool Jewish our main standard bearers but, and I hate to say this, I have a sneaking feeling that we may have lost our main chances of lifting the trophy this year because there are a couple of useful challengers hanging around from "that other lot" Colonsay 'B' and Wav. Lab. 'C'.

Cadwa 'A' are perhaps the most intriguing team in our division, last year they finished well down in the league whilst always promising better things. This season they are at it again, currently they are third from bottom and yet they can beat Trinity, second from top of our neighbours 3B, and I understand that Mr. Hankin says that Trinity are a very good team. I am starting off these notes on the relegation issue as a change from the usual practice of discussing the frontrunners first. This is mainly due to the fact that I have heard, in a roundabout way, that my mention of Rafters for relegation has upset Alan Malthouse (Rafters). This is understandable as since our last issue they have trebled their points total and climbed above Bath St. 'D'. These two teams meet this week and I should imagine that this will be a real "Cup-tie" type match. As they both meet again in the final match of the season we could possibly have to wait until then before this issue is settled. The main reason for Rafters increase in points has been the form shown by Brian Jennings who has collected a good 50% of their points in Nov. and Dec. and has recorded several good wins in doing so. On four occasions when they have lost 9-1 he has been the lone winner for his team. The present points system favours those teams who are prepared to fight for every set and if ALL of Rafters team are prepared to pull their weight as Brian is doing then they could well prove me wrong. However, there is a hard road ahead of them and their only consolation is that Brian need only get them away from bottom position at the end of the season for them to avoid the drop!

I was far more mistaken about College of Technology for they are doing well, mainly as a result of a real team effort. They have defeated those beneath them and have picked up useful sets against stronger teams, including four off L'pool Jewish. They also appear to be trying to outdo Eng. Elec. in players used. To-date the total for both is 12. Quite a large

number for less than half the season!

The pace at the top of the table has not slackened and very little separates the top seven teams. No team can be sure of their results when playing teams opposing them for promotion and all continue to drop sets to teams in the lower half of the table.

Police suffered their first defeat of the season at the hands, surprisingly enough, of Colonsay 'C'. A very good win for them and one which was no doubt warmly appreciated by their own 'D' team. The L'pool Jewish strengthened their claim with an extremely good win over Colonsay 'D' 6-4. In this match Dave Crispin (Colonsay) suffered his first double defeat of the season to Dave Blake and Eddie Johnson. I think Dave Blake must be the best No. 1 in the division and he is picking up plenty of points for the Jewish. The L'pool Jewish are going really well and I have a feeling that they already consider that the title will be theirs. But I am sure that the other contenders also feel the same way about their chances.

An interesting point about Dave Crispin who has turned out regularly and very successfully at No. 1 for Colonsay 'D' and has also done well for the 'C' team. Although a junior he is not a member of the L'pool team and yet Alan Williams, who plays at No. 2 for the same team is. I wonder why?

I suppose that I will eventually have to stick my neck out and name the top two, but so close is the position that for the time being I will be content to say it will be between L'pool Jewish, Colonsay 'D', Police 'C' and Wav. Lab. 'D', with the first two looking the most likely at present. But these four will be hotly pursued by L.Y.C.A., Eng. Elec. and Colonsay 'C' who are all capable of upsetting the others, so small is the difference between them in playing strength.

A sidelight on posting of score-cards, whereas several clubs try to deliver without postage charges and others make do with a 4d. stamp, Essemmay send their score-cards first class with a 5d. sramp! There must be a moral in that somewhere.

When playing L.Y.C.A. things could get very confused if the opposing captain nominated L.Y.C.A. players by name, for with three Hughes in the team you are liable to find yourself with the wrong opponent, or worse still, faced with all three at once!
