Editorial

One thing you will notice is that although Ken Armson has retired from the 'hot seat' he is still continuing to distribute the Digest and has very kindly written some divisional notes for this issue. However he has assured me that he will be too busy to do this again so that the next issue, which is due out soon, will be without some divisional notes unless someone from the divisions concerned volunteers to write them. It does not take too long and is a good means of finding out what is going on in your particular division. It also means that you can get your own point of view across in this wildly successful 'international' magazine for sportsmen-women. (I send a copy to the U.S.A.).

If you doubt the effectiveness of the Digest as a means of putting your views across just think of the publicity the 4-a-side system got last season. Would it have got the necessary two-thirds majority at the last A.G.M. if the issue had not been discussed in the Digest? I doubt it as most representatives know how they are going to vote at the A.G.M. before they get there. One small letter in the Digest reaches a vastly larger audience than the most brilliant speech at the A.G.M. Not only is he an exceptional player, he also has his head screwed on the right way which is more than you can say for a lot of other players with less ability but a higher opinion of themselves.

From the Secretary's Desk

Nearer home we record with deep regret the loss in a boating accident last May of Don Gauld, a member of the Police Table Tennis Section for the past 20 years, and a highly respected member of the league.

You will shortly receive a quantity of draw tickets with a letter asking you to sell them on behalf of the league, we do ask for your co-operation in this, as in these times of rising costs, this is a foolproof way of making a profit for the league with no risk attached, a profit which could well mean the difference between a rise in fees next year or our ability once again to keep the cost of Table Tennis in Liverpool at its present low figure.

Book Review

'The Way To The Top' — by Denis Neale

When I first saw the book I must confess my first impressions were 'Not much there for twenty-five bob'. And I said so to Denis. 'Read it first and then tell me whether you think it's worth it' he said.

Well I did read it and I say without hesitation one of the best books on table tennis I've ever read. Denis is above all honest. He says exactly what he thinks and gives bis reasons. He doesn't ask you to agree with him, he leaves it to you, but I think when you have read it you will have to agree Denis is a remarkably deep thinker about the game and anxious and eager to help others who want to be good.

I found his life story interesting although not very detailed or lengthy. By far the biggest proportion of the book is devoted to telling you how to improve your game. His advice will not suit all the purists but it is sound, helpful advice. As one who has done (or tried to do) a considerable amount of coaching I found much of what Denis said I had already been doing. I also found a considerable amount of advice which I will attempt to put to good use in the future. The photographs are first rate and the advice on training, etc., is bound to be helpful.

In no way will the book be regarded as controversial and I feel sure this is the way Denis intended it. Denis is really concerned with one thing—winning. Winning fairly at all times—but winning. Denis has never been one to use a paragraph when a sentence would do and so it is in the book.

I have a feeling that if you buy this book you won't want to put it down until you have finished.

The 'Midland Open' lived up to its reputation as a great tournament-well organised, exciting play, good conditions. One incident stands out in my mind. Denis Neale playing Graham Davies. Who would back Graham to beat Denis? Not many, even fewer after Denis won the first at 10. Graham took the second at 21-19 then came the third. Neck and neck, Denis fell behind, recovered and the match reached 20 all. It was a set Denis desperately wanted to win-who is going to turn £25 down (apart from the honour of winning). Davies leads 21-20. A quick hitting rally follows and Denis forces Graham away from the table, hits straight down the middle. Graham manages to get a bat to it and returns it deep near the centre line. The ball drops, apparently straight down. The umpire could have been in a dilemma. Did it touch or didn't it? No hesitation from sportsman Neale. Quick as a flash he says 'Touched' and is half way round the table to shake hands with Graham before the Welshman moved. After shaking hands with the umpire he sits down-disappointed but his reputation as a sportsman enhanced. I spoke to him later. 'Did he think the umpire saw it touch?' 'I don't know' Denis told me 'But I KNEW it touched. If I had only been 50% sure I would have waited for the umpire's decision. But if the ball definitely touches I always say so-what ever the score.' In any sport amateur or professional there is always room for the true sportsman. Denis is certainly that.

The Nissen Tournament was a big success at Loughborough with in the region of 350 watching. A disappointing one-sided final was won comfortably by Neale over Barnes. The best game was Barnes v. Taylor in the semi-final. Taylor seemed more aggressive than usual. Both in play and outlook. He seemed gritty, determined, and he could so easily have won. Keep it up Trevor!

Whilst on about Trevor. I was speaking to him about the Chinese at the Scandinavian Open in Sweden. Trevor thought their men weren't playing too well but was very impressed with the play of their women. My guess if they play in the World's they will sweep the board in the Men's events but miss out on the Women's. (I fancy one of three—Alexandru (Rumania), Rudnova (Russia) or Vostova (Czechoslovakia) to take the Ladies Singles title. Trevor thinks their women will take the lot and their men won't do so well. Anyway we shall see—assuming of course they enter!

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A History of . . .

Linnets

The inaugural meeting of the club was held on the 6th February, 1951 and the original members consisted of 15 players from other mixed activity clubs who wanted a club formed solely for the purpose of playing table-tennis. Don Brown, Jim Green and Mr. and Mrs. Sturgeon were among these founder members. Premises were found at 14a Linnet Lane, (hence the club's name), and the club entered two làdies' and three men's teams in the league. Jim Green was elected secretary after this first season—a position which he held until his death.

By 1953 the club was getting on its feet financially when it was found that the treasurer had absconded with f72 in cash belonging to the club and had also paid himself prizes in the club pool to which he had not been entitled. The cash was eventually repaid in instalments but it was a severe blow. In the 1954/1955 season the club moved its premises to Christ Church in Hesketh Street and continued to grow in membership. It is worth noting that even at this time Jim Green had to write to all the clubs in the league regarding players arriving late at matches so this is not just a recent curse!

More successes followed in the 1956/1957 season when three teams were promoted and the 'A' team won the Rumjahn Cup. Two members were chosen to play for Liverpool and several local closed championships were won by our players. Two years later we were on the move again! This time it was to a garage in Lucknow Street, but this was not particularly satisfactory so in 1962 we moved to our present premises (the 'ice box') in Aigburth Cricket ground. This m'ant the members building a new hut, a process which took over six months but which finally gave us premises we could call our own.

This also helped the membership figures to soar so that we have over 70 players in 1964 and were the biggest table tennis club in the North of England, entering 8 men's and 3 ladies' teams in the league. At the same time we had 20 women table tennis players and in the 1963/64 season the women's team created what must be a record of consistency in the league for this was the seventh consecutive season that they had played together without ever having to have a reserve! We nearly had another club record the next season when Ken Foulkes went until his very last set of the season before being beaten.

All good things come to an end however, and in 1968 there was a mass exodus from the club leaving us with 5th division standard players playing in the 2nd division. All three teams finished bottom of their respective divisions, winning a grand total of two matches between them—and one of those was a walkover! This bad patch has not lasted long though and last season the first team walked away with the 2nd division and the Rumjahn Cup. Now fourth in the 1st division this team is composed of Blackburn players. Last season John Baron became the first player in the history of the club to have a 100% record—both league and cup—ably supported by Frank Thomas, Keith Jackson, Phil Blake and Dave Cottrell. The club can also boast of three firemen (to cool down things!) and Eddie Owens, who is the only player I know who plays with his cap on! One thing is certain we all enjoy our table tennis, even when we lose, and hope that you get as much pleasure out of playing us as we do from playing you.

FIRST DIVISION

As a change from that lot at the top let's start with the tangle at the bottom for it's all happening down there, new signings, unexpected results and the commencement of the 'silly' season. This makes efforts to sort things out extremely difficult for with results like Liv. Y.M. 'A' 2 M. Hill 8; Wav. Lab. 7 W'loo Pk. 3; and the silliest of them all, Trinity 5 Eng. Eicc. 5.

One sure thing is that W'loo Park will be relegated to the 2nd Division, but the problem of who will accompany them may not be clear for some time yet. Many were convinced that Trinity would not be able to hold their own but with a points total of 48 from 13 matches to date they are more than holding their own. They are the only team involved in the relegation issue who have made no new signings and it remains to be seen whether or not they can continue gaining sets off the strengthened teams of their opponents. Their star player is Ricky Brown who is having a very good season ably supported by others of his team-mates in bringing off surprise victories.

Colonsay must surely be out of trouble for they have now added L. Barclay to their recent signings of Mercer and Hayes. Their actual points total is unknown as four of their first half results are not yet known to me. Mossley Hill have brought John Kenwright back but for them it may be too late to avoid the drop unless Beauclair, whose results have improved since S. Kaufman commenced playing

regularly, fall away again. The main complication stems from the fact that these strengthened teams will improve on 1st half results and probably overtake teams who thought themselves safe. Rafters, for instance, could possibly find themselves caught up in this struggle.

It is a good thing for the 1st Division that new, and not so new, faces are coming in, for it makes for better matches, but it is a sad reflection on the strength of our league that this is necessary. No club seems to have any new players coming through and the future prospects seem very bleak, particularly for our representative teams.

A few words about the front-runners to stifle their complaints. Eng. Elec. look certainties for the double again for although the Labour Club have narrowed the gap they do not seem consistent or strong enough to take over the lead, although with Eng. Elec. in such a generous mood as to give Trinity 5 scts I suppose anything is possible. Their only defeat, however, was by Wav. Lab. when without Tony Clayton, and thus exposed as just another good team, they lost 6-4. This was not a night for the faint-hearted for the match was not settled until the last set of doubles. Tony Rigby cmerged as the star with two good victories over Birch and D'Arcy and taking away their 100% average at the same time.

The Y.M. seem to be declining as a major team and with no new players in view they can have little hope of regaining any titles for a while. The team to watch is Linnets, who have made a successful return to the 1st Division and future prospects for this team look very good indeed. They look likely cup finalists and will not finish lower than 4th. If they stay together next season they should emerge as really strong contenders for the title.

Not being a fortune-teller I will not make any forecasts, but I will say that Dame Fortune can be very fickle as we all know and I have the feeling that Trinity may be needing a lot of fortune during the next few weeks.

It seems a little strange to be writing the first notes in January when almost half the scason has passed and by now many of the season's topics have been resolved, including the promotion issue.

There is no doubt in my mind that Bath Street and Wavertree Labour 'C' will go up to the first division. There was a slight doubt about Bath Street's chances at the beginning of the season but now that Arthur Taylor and Bill Clayton are playing regularly the doubles have disappeared. Wavertree too have some good players in their team, including the steady Norman Chaloner and Ron Barke. I see John Molyneux also plays for this teamyou have to be most polite when playing him or else you may find yourself as a star feature in his column. Which of these two teams will finish first is at the moment uncertain. At the time of writing the Labour Club have a slight lead but whether they will hold it remains to be seen.

As usual we have a small group of teams chasing the leaders hoping they will slip up. These are Crawfords and the two Colonsay teams. The Colonsay club baffle me. No doubt they have good reasons for splitting their strength and I realise that it is difficult to grade the amount of good players they have, but it does not look very good on paper when the 'A' team is beaten by the 'B' team, especially with a scoreline of 8-2. It is interesting to see Les French in the 'B' team as he started last season in the first team. I noticed too that John O'Sullivan was back in the 'B' team after last season's promotion from the 'B' to the 'A'. Still, as I have said, no doubt they have excellent reasons for all the change.

Down at the bottom Knotty Ash and Cadwa are certain to go down unless they sign new players, although I see that Cadwa have lured Billy Crafter back. He will be most welcome although I feel that they will need more than Bill to keep them in the division. Who goes down with them is anybody's guess at the moment, a number of teams could find themselves in a fight to stay up, with Trinity 'A' and Sefton having things a little bit harder than most.

Four-a-side is now with us and most people 1 have asked seem to prefer it to Five-a-side. One reservation I have is playing Doubles in small cramped rooms—and there are some of those in the league! So far I have not come across such a room in this division as yet, but I would be interested to hear from those who have. It does, however, give us more Table Tennis and that cannot be bad.

This year I have decided to have a congratulations note as well as commiscrations so here goes: Congratulations to J. Dancaster of Liverpool Jewish, D. Goodwin of Colonsay 'A' and F. Farquaharson of Wavertree Labour 'C' all of whom beat Arthur Taylor. No mean feat this, as most of the First Division were unable to manage it last year. My commiserations go to Les French of Colonsay 'B' who lost to clubmate D. Goodwin 23-21, 20-22, 22-20.

One final point. I have noticed two players have given away walkovers in the early part of the season—this now means the loss of three sets which is a lot of sets for a team to lose in one match. Think about it.

The battle for the two top spots in this division must be the most interesting in the league for six teams are battling for the opportunity of playing and division table tennis next season and at the moment it is still wide open. At one time the Labour Club were the pacemakers closely pursued by Eng. Elec. 'B' and it almost seemed safe to predict that these two would finish at the top in that order. The last four matches for the Labour Club have changed all that and from possible winners they have gone to outsiders. This was not so much a slide as an avalanche, the result of two defeats (6-4, and 7-3) a draw and a 6-4 win in four successive matches. They have fallen to Linnets 7-3 and University

Linnets themselves would be in a much stronger position if they could strengthen the 3 and 4 positions where they are losing most of their sets. Their strength is at 1 and 2 where Alan Dean and Ray Lavin are having a very good season including a very successful partnership in the doubles. With better support their chances of promotion would be pretty high. University appear to be the strongest team in the division but are denied their proper place in the table due to the fact that they have to complete their matches by 9-45 p.m. as this is almost impossible they are having to concede unplayed sets to their opponents which has resulted in possible victories becoming defeats. This happened in their matches against Way. Labour and Eng. Elec. when they had to concede two sets each time and lost 6-4. In the return match away to Wavertree This surely Labour they won 6-4. speaks for itself.

English Electric have taken full advantage of the Labour Club's defeats and have moved into top place but could find themselves hard They have pressed to stay there. defeated all the contenders with the exception of a 6-4 defeat by Wavertree Labour. Theirs is a strong steady team and if I had to make a forecast I would put my money on them but would not be surprised if proved wrong. With strong outsiders such as Palatine and Rafters to provide the stumbling blocks a lot can happen in the second half of the season so it is a case of perming any two from six.

Police, Liv. Y.M. and Maghull are all having a season of mixed fortunes, they are all potentially strong teams but their results have not been as good as we would have expected. Perhaps the second half may bring an improvement in their results.

With Stanley House dropping out only one team will be relegated and this doubtful honour will fall on Crawfords 'B' who are just not strong enough to hold their own in this division.

Having read this report and not seen your name mentioned it may occur to you that a volunteer from this division is required who can write much better rubbish. If so, please contact the editor immediately, as the next issue is due out shortly. Should no offer be forthcoming then my next three articles will be exclusives on the Wavertree Labour Team !!!

As this is the first digest of the season, and we are already half way through the fixtures, my plan of analysing 2 or 3 clubs in detail every issue has now been abandoned, due to lack of space and time. However I will endeavour to mention as many players and clubs as possible. This column is your column and as I have said before please do not hesitate to contact me if you have any information or statistics you wish to have printed.

We extend a welcome to Liverpool Y.M., Sparta, Waterloo Park, and Bohemians, but have unfortunately lost one club—Oddyssey. Looking at the league table Liverpool Y.M. do not seem to have made any arrangements about staying in this division.

At the time of writing they are top with 78 points from 11 games followed by one of the founder members of this division-Orrell-who have collected 67 points from 11 games. I am not boasting, but I think I mentioned Gordon Kirk and Co. would be there or thereabouts because of a few signings they have made. And much improved Rafters are in 3rd place. Following a 6-4 defeat by Orrell in the Hyde Cup, the two teams met again 5 days later, with Rafters hammering Orrell by 7 sets to 3, so it shows just what a little The most determination can do. peculiar feature was that both teams played exactly the same players in exactly the same order, and both games were at Rafters.

At the other end of the table Bath Street had 34 points and were a bad last, until Liverpool Jewish decided that as it was snowing and rather cold, table tennis was the last thing they wanted to do so Bath Street gained 10 pts., this division suffers its first 'Thrown' match, and the lewish club lose many friends especially from the lower reaches of the division.
