Editorial

Oh dear! Only my second, and penultimate, issue and I have got to apologise again for the late arrival of the magazine. This is due to the postal strike and not to my two month annual holiday in the Bahamas. Seriously though, I would like to thank all the contributors who have gone out of their way to write and deliver their notes on time in difficult circumstances.

No doubt most of you will have heard that Colonsay are to loose their clubhouse. This will mean that about 40 players, including two teams of women, will be without somewhere to play next season. Their hall was certainly one of the coldest places to play in Liverpool but their conditions were amongst the best, and good conditions are few and far between in Liverpool.

In fact conditions suitable for table tennis are becoming increasingly scarce, which must cause some of the clubs in the League some concern. These are the clubs that exist purely for table tennis and do not have any larger body to fall back on in time of trouble, as for example do teams run by sports and social clubs and individual firms. In several cases these clubs are in premises which may well be demolished in the not too distant future, to make way for redevelopment projects. Alternatively they may themselves find their premises unsuitable to cater for the growing numbers of people who will be trying to play table tennis.

And, believe it or not, it is likely that more and more people will be taking up the sport. National trends show that the amount of time available for leisure is increasing and will increase still further in the future. Table tennis is a cheap sport to take up and there are no social barriers as there are with other sports. More important, youngsters are now being taught to play, and play well, at school so it is extremely likely that they will want to join a club when, or even before, they leave school. Hence there is going to be increasing pressure on the existing facilities, and a demand for the provision of new facilities.

The problem is that any new conditions provided may not in fact be suitable. Nowadays, to be justified on economic grounds, buildings have to be used as intensively as possible. Hence school halls are being used by adults at night and new community developments try to cater for as many sports as possible under one roof. This will obviously create problems for a major necessity for our sport is a fairly large area which can be isolated, but is not too large so that all atmosphere is lost.

Even where the room is the right size problems can occur. At the University, for example, their room cannot be isolated from the main heating system, with the result that it gets like a Turkish Bath at times. Similarly at Bedford House I have been waiting to play only to find that the cleaners are polishing the floor! All clubs have some fault or other and obviously it will be impossible to eradicate all of these in the future. But there is no reason why new conditions that are being built should be as bad as the existing ones. It is up to the E.T.T.A. on a national scale, and local committees at a lower level, to make sure that our needs are made known. To architects and planners. In these days of increasing participation we will only have ourselves to blame if we get bad playing conditions in the future.

Lancashire and Cheshire League

To date, our City teams have played a total of 36 league matches, winning 25 and drawing 1.

The Ladies 1st team has won 2, played a creditable draw with Stockport, and lost to Manchester. Our team of Mabel Francis, Jean Reynolds and Val Lee still has to play Crewe and a re-arranged fixture with the strong Blackpool League.

In winning 5 matches in succession, John O'Sullivan's Ladies' 'A' team lead div. 2 with 10 pts. Composed entirely of Junior Players, the next match against Southport is all important, because, as far as can be ascertained, Southport are also un-defeated. The selected team is Suzanne Manning, Brenda Williams and Barbara Kirkman.

The Men's 1st team of Tony Clayton, Pete D'Arcy and lately Wally Allanson instead of Gordon Birch, who has opted out because of business commitments, has played 5 and won 2. I am sure that their final position will be much higher than it is now.

Our Men's 'A' team has only lost I match out of 5 played to date. This was to the Blackpool League by a narrow margin of 6 sets to 4, after a hectic journey there on a wet and windy Saturday evening. At the last moment, Don Cameron kindly consented to transport the team, I know that Don would be disappointed to see the side loose, on each occasion on which he has taken a team, they have won.

The Youth team of Dave Roberts, Chris Brewer and Ron Burke has also been enjoying a successful season. Out of 9 matches played, they have won 7 and lost 2.

On the two occasions on which he has been called in as reserve, John Marshall has performed with great distinction.

Our youngest team in the Junior South Division has played 7, won 4, lost 3.

Latterly, Eric Hardman and Philip Topping have been selected to join John Marshall in the team to the exclusion of the Junior girls who have been playing in the Ladies' 'A' Team. This season, John is filling the No. 1 spot with great authority. I feel that his experience in our own First Division with his club (Rafters), has helped him considerably.

PING PONG OR TABLE TENNIS?

The origins of table tennis seem to be shrouded in mystery but have been attributed to either India or England in about the 1880's. At this time the balls were made of cork and the game was very much an adaption of real or royal (indoor) tennis.

Various firms introduced their own equipment and rules at the time and so the game came to be called by a series of trade marks such as "Gossima" and "Ping-Pong". About 1900 it became a craze in many parts of the world and in Great Britain a Ping-Pong Association was formed, much to the amusement of Music-hall comedians. As a result of this adverse publicity and difficulties over the use of trade marks the sport stagnated everywhere, except Hungary, until the 1920's. In 1926 the term table tennis was adopted as the official name for the sport and the International Table Tennis Federation was formed. The following year the English Table Tennis Association came into being, hence nowadays we all play table tennis and not ping pong (in theory at least).

Whilst on the subject of the early history of the sport it is interesting to note that before the advent of sponge, which incidentally was banned at first by the I.T.T.F., the dominant country was Hungary. The first English open championships took place in 1921/2 and for the first three years the men's singles title was won by English players. After this, up to 1957, it was won ten times by Hungary four times by England, three times by India, Poland and Czechoslovakia, twic by France and once each by Japan and the U.S.A. The four English victories were by F. J. Perry in 1928/9, Richard Bergmann in 1947/8 and Johnny Leach, M.B.E. in 1948/9 and 1950/1. Perhaps it is about time we won it again!

No volunteers have been forthcoming and so the job has fallen to me again. matches, and others only one! I hope that the recent postal difficulties are the reason. At the top of the table Y.M.C.A.
