Editorial

In nearly all organised sport the basic motive is competition. In all our cup competitions, from the Readman to the Stamp, from round one to the finals—every team pulls out all the stops and the competitive spirit is really terrific.

League warfare, I admit, has not the same edge, but basically the will to win and field top teams still applies with a few exceptions who have genuine difficulties with players. The one division that deteriorates year after year—is—our pride and joy, our pies be resistance—our FIRST DIVISION.

What on earth is happening here? First of all it must be said that individual battles leave nothing to be desired in their effort and endeavour. But team-wise we have a very different story. In this division, which should be a shining example to the rest, two and three-man teams are played far too often, two, three and four reserves are commonplace, teams field mediocre to attrocious sides all season and when relegation looms the old faithfuls come along and pull the team out of the mire. Fair enough you might say—but the same procedure takes place the following season—just to keep them in Division 1 and then we invariably get the end-of-the-season "funny" results. All these things are tending to make our division one into a competitive farce.

The main reason, I suppose, is that so many of our top players are committed, and more important, give preference to other local leagues. One player I hear is signed for five. Players are selected for city and county squads, etc., and cannot play. I am good enough, so if I don't play this week they can't drop me—a lack of dedicated interest and spirit—and, of course, the legit excuses like night school, etc.

With their regular team Y.M.C.A. could have been crowned champs last November—but even they, with no other contenders for the title, have fallen in the reservitis disease.

I thought at one time that a 3-a-side premier division would be the answer to all our problems but I cannot see it answering the problem under review, although it would improve standards if all our best players played each other all the time. Personally, I would be against the league going to 3-a-side as room usage, increased subs and less players playing could come into it. However, that is a discussion for another day.

The improvement of competition in division one is quite a problem. I don't know the answer—do you?

LOCALS ABROAD

The Men's 'A' team need only a draw with Nelson 'A' on March 19th to clinch the Division 4 title. After a lapse of 10 years English Electric 'A' No. 1, Rod McPherson, returned to representative competition when playing against Lancaster and Morecambe 'A', and accompanied by Clive Strettle and Tony O'Connor, they defeated the county town 9-1. This same trio also ended the title hopes of Salford 'A' by the same score.

With John McNee injured and John Marshall unavailable, first team debuts were made by Clive Strettle and Tony O'Connor, in the home fixture with Preston. The visitors were fortunate to find Paul Tsang still feeling the after-effects of 'flu. The team of Ian Smith, Tony Rigby and Allan Whittle being well content with a 6 sets to 4 v. ctory.

Tony O'Connor impressed with good wins over Allan Whittle and then showed his fighting qualities when coming from behind in the third to beat Tony Rigby.

The 'A' team combination still unbeaten of Strettle and O'Connor scored a good doubles win over Smith and Rigby when 14-9 in the last two games and winning 14 and 14. Our strongest first team put up a great show at Stockport on March 4, when they defeated Hampson, Schofield and Hulme by 8 sets to 2. Star man was Paul Tsang, who beat all three, and complemented by McNee and Marshall, who both beat Schofield and Hulme. Derek Schofield said he had never lost all three singles in a league match before.

The final match of the season should be exciting, with Hyde providing two England-ranked players in No. 11 John Hilton and No. 14 Nigel Eckersley. Our team of Julie Black, Julie Turner and Marie Gaul scored a fine 7 sets to 3 victory over Stockport, led by Doreen Schofield.

The 6 sets to 4 result in Preston's favour was the first defeat for over 7 years by a team other than Manchester, in Lancashire and Cheshire League play. This was followed up by an easy 9 sets to 1 win over Wirral, with Julie Turner replacing Marie Gaul.

For their final match of the season the team has been deprived to the services of Brenda, Julie Black and Julie Turner, who are all playing for the County on March 13. Our opponents on that day are Bury, who wouldn't agree to a change of match date. Our team on that day will be: Barbara, Marie and Paula Breithaupt, who will be making her first team debut.

The Junior boys, in their first match for three months, had a good 10-0 victory over Stockport. However, for the match at home to Oldham they were without Clive Strettle and Tony O'Connor, who were at the Lancashire Open. Their replacements certainly made an impact and 16-years-old Phil Thomson, of English Electric, could feel pleased with himself in his first City match when he won his three singles events and along with clubmate Graeme Black, took the doubles.

Fourteen-years-old Mark Monaghan, of Kirkby Sports, also recorded a successful City debut, when after nervously losing his first set, he crushed the visitors' No. 1 21-6, 21-17, and followed by beating the No. 2 21-15, 21-11. With Graeme unexpectedly losing the last set to the visitors' No. 1, the final score of 8 sets to 2 was quite impressive. For the match with Bury, Phil Thomson retained his place, with Clive being on County duty. At the half-way stage our lads trailed by 3 sets to 2, but with Tony gaining a maximum three singles sets, and also the doubles with Graeme, we clinched it by 6 sets to 4. Wilmott Cup—Round 2, at Leeds, was very disappointing, our team of McNee, Marshall and Tsang going down 5 sets to 1!

The Ladies' team of Julie Black, Julie Turner and Marie Gaul, with

Alex Gould driving, made the long trip to Leicester, for Round 2 of the Rose Bowl. They gained only in experience when Karen Rogers and Anita Stevenson saw the home side to an 8-1 win, with Julie Black being our lone winner.

Tony O'Connor (Colonsay) has leaped to Number 3 in the national cadet rankings.

In the club championship Liverpool Y.M.C.A. beat Bury Champs—Greenwood and Business Houses Champs, Oris, and lost to Little Lever, Eolton, 5-1, possibly through not using Paul Tsang to the best advantage.

John McNee (Rafters) our "och aye" bloke from Birkenhead, is now Scotland's Number 2. John sent me the finest script I have ever received on the West German Open Championships, in which he competed. It is such excellent stuff I must use it in some way.

The Readman Cup semi-finalists are Y.M.C.A., Eng. Elec. and Eng. Elec. 'A' and Rafters 'A'. Wav. Lab. 'A', fighting to avoid relegation, fought hard to stay in the cup. Eddie Moran beat Jim Lynch 21-15, 30-32, 21-17. McPherson and Pheysey lost to Fennah and Gilmour 20-22, 21-19, 22-24 and Lynch and Philips beat Moran and Gil-more 21-15, 22-20. Dave Butterworth and Alan Reid were brought into Bath Street's first team after Bath St. 'A"s elimination from the cup, days earlier. They gave Bath St. a 3-1 lead. Rafters 'A' won 6-4, the other singles coming from Butterworth. For Rafters 'A', Alan Timewell won his singles, beating France and Moran. With Ronnie Rumjahm he won the doubles, Ferguson and Crafter a singles each and their doubles.

The tie of the round, however, was Rafters v Y.M.C.A. McNee and Marshall won all their games in the first leg but Williams and Davey failed. In the replay Rafters without McNee, lost 3-7. On this occasion Williams beat both Turtle and Lee and Marshall also beat Lee. A fine win here for George Smith in beating John Marshall 16-21, 21-19, 21-19. Bath St. seem to be pulling themselves clear of the drop partly due to Dave Butterworth doing a good job at No. 1 for them and his own team, Bath St. 'A'. Elec. 'A', who only had two players—all credit to McPherson 69% and Pheysey 54.6%. Congratulations to Rod on his return to the city team.

Fellow strugglers, Colonsay, were beaten by Rafters 'A' 7-3, O'Connor beating Crafter, and Brenda Williams 38% beat Don Davies 27%. Rafters 'A' also drew with their first team minus John McNee, Davies and Timewell winning their singles and Ron Ruming their singles and Ron Ruming Brian Davey. Against Trinity, Ferguson beat me against Eng. Elec. Crafter beat Sill 46% in two deuce games, Timewell beat Birch 87.9% and four points were gathered against Wav. Lab., Davies winning his two games against Roy Smith 67% and Alan Cameron.

Colonsay's struggle for survival again is not helped by playing short, as against Wav. Lab. and Eng. Elec. 'A' they lost 1-9 and 2-8. Should you arrive at Colonsay on time and are ready to play and there is no team, don't worry. At roughly 7-55 p.m. their newest star arrives, followed by the team, changed and ready to play.

How come they are ready when they have just arrived? The secret is they have been knocking up in the next hall, after all, games can't be claimed until 8-00 p.m. and the opposition can always play without a ball or a table or net. Matches should start at 7-30 p.m.—is this why they sometimes play short?

Wav. Lab. 'A' beat their first team 6-4, Worthington 46% losing to Hurworth and Gilmour, Tierney 36% lost to Farquharson and Gilmour. This followed two draws at Palmerston and Trinity 'A'. Fennah beat Dave 50% and brother Sammy Holland 50% and with Gilmour, the doubles. A good win for Gilmour over Bryce 64% and Hurworth over Sammy. Against Trinity 'A' Gilmour beat Merrick 40% and Dunning 50%. Against Eng. Elec., Hurworth and Gilmour beat Alec Sill, the score 7-3 to

Electric. A win for Eddie Moran over Paul Lennard and Moran and Cameron over Brown and Chase, gave Wavertree two points against Trinity. Bath St. 'A' seem to have a far stronger side than their first team. On the night they played Trinity, Ken Jones 31% beat Bagot and with Walton, beat Brown and Chase in the doubles. Bath St. 'A' seven, Rafters three — what a shock! On closer scrutiny, how-ever, we find Alan Read and Butterworth added to their wins over Alan Timewell with five claimed games. A win for Butterworth over Turtle 70% and Jones and Walton over Tsang and Lee, shook Y.M. who won 8-2. Trinity 'A' were also beaten by Y.M. 7-3, Bagot and Griffiths 42% both beating Turtle and Harris, and Griffiths beat Smith and Turtle. A draw with Wav. Lab., thanks to Harris with two wins.

With Palmerston further strengthening their team, they are now in position to challenge Y.M.C.A. for the title. The title looks now to be wrapped up by Liverpool Y.M.C.A. 'A' and Palmerston 'A'. Police appear to have pulled themselves clear of relegation leaving Bath St. 'B'. Linacre and Colonsay 'B' disputing who will go down with Waterloo Park and Colonsay 'A'. Bath St. 'B' have been in difficulty all season but are now fighting hard for every Y.M.C.A. point. Linacre are the team who have slipped badly. After 10 matches they had 57 points. Since then, however, they have only won one match, 6-4, against Colonsay 'A' in the following 10 and are now perilously placed.

In a match in which 6 games extended to 3 sets, Linacre lost 5 of them and the match 3-7. In parlicular Jack Davidson missed out losing 20-22 in the 3rd against Barry McLeod and going on to lose 19-21 in the 3rd against Gareth Jones. Frank Lacey also fell to Gareth's brinkmanship 16-21, 24-22, 19-21. Frank's narrowest miss this season was against Ted Mandaluff, going down 24-26 in the 3rd set in a match against Y.M.C.A. which proved pointless for Linacre. Rafters 'B' have introduced A. Nisted and Pete Short. An 8-2 win against Colonsay 'B' with Reg. Hetherington belying his years in beating Barbara Kirkman and Dave Piper, and a 6-4 win against Trinity 'B'. The Police have made the most notable advance with all their players improving. In par-ticular Gareth Jones is in fine form with wins over John Higham and Dave Wilson, of Trinity, to earn a draw. In a determined vein they beat Beauclair 6-4, a listless Ted Birch losing all his matches.

Old Swan, Trinity 'B', Liverpool Jewish, English Electric 'B' and Beauclair are all similarly placed. Old Swan fell further behind with 4-6 and 2-8 defeats against Liverpool Jewish and English Elec. 'B'. Trinity B' have had a number of close matches, losing 4-6 to Liverpool Jewish in a match in which John Hodges and John Henshaw won all their matches for Jewish; won an their materies for Jewish, losing 4-6 to Beauclair and then beating Eng. Elec. B' 6-4, thanks to Dave Wilson beating George Bradley and Bill Ellard in singles and doubles with Dave Newton. Despite John Higham being in fine form against Y.M.C.A., beating Noel Fagan and Ted Mandaluff in singles and doubles with Tom, the Y.M.C.A. avenged their previous defeat. Liverpool Jewish used up the last of Les French's quota for this division against Beauclair for the second time this season and it paid off again with a 6-4 win. I managed to avenge my previous defeat against Les, but with Frank Murphy lost to Les and Dave Money. This is a great left and right-handed combination and with Dave Money using excessive side-spin into the backhand corner. Since Christmas, Eng. Elec. 'B' have been doing well with good wins of 8-2 against Old Swan and 6-4 against Palmerston, but their outside chance of promotion must have been dashed by a 2-8 defeat against Beauclair. Instrumental in this defeat was Ted Birch, who raised his game to beat Brian Crolley and George Bradley in expedite for the second time this season. (If anyone likes that sort of challenge Ted claims to be unbeatable in any match going to expedite). Beauclair's challenge fizzled out in a crushing 1-9 defeat at Palmerston. In a match in which seven games extended to three sets, two matches to expedite, finishing at 1 a.m., 1-9 was perhaps not a true reflection of the competition but this Palmerston team of Evans, Bradbury, Haves Burrows looks as strong as any in the division. Particularly impressive in this match were Arthur Hayes and Ian Burrows who, on his night, has one of the best backhand hits in Liverpool. This defeat took much of the motivation out of some of the Beauclair players and two further defeats followed. However, the same players showed they can rise to the occasion when they beat Y.M.C.A. 9-1, although Y.M.C.A. were without a player, but they were well beaten with Ted Mandaluff losing both singles to Ted Birch and Frank Murphy.

Bob Hudson continues to recruit players far and wide, his latest addition being Jack Evans, from Bolton. With Neale now in Manchester is any team safe from Bob?

For the top-of-the-table clash against Y.M.C.A., their most consistent player, Arthur Hayes, was not able to turn out so the Y.M.C.A. were perhaps somewhat fortunate to be able to hang on for a draw. Ian Burrows turned it on for Palmerston, beating Ted Mandaluff and Harry Johnson, whilst Noel Fagan won both his singles for Y.M.C.A. To me, it looks like very negative tactics by Y.M.C.A. in switching their doubles order, playing their best pair as No. 2 doubles—thus squaring the doubles results.

In the semi-finals Y.M.C.A. beat Linacre, whilst Beauclair let Palmerston off the hook after taking a 5-3 lead. Mick Allen produced his best form to beat Jack Evans and Bob Hudson, whilst Arthur Hayes excelled to pull Palmerston back for a draw. In the replay Palmerston won easily.

Pride of place this time must go to Electric Supply for reaching the final of the Hyde Cup the hard way by beating Palmerston 'B' 6-4 and Maghull 7-3. This shows that Ernie Owens Pete Carney, Les Eyans, A. Biggs and R. Smith are currently the best team in our Division, and we wish them the best of luck in the final against Liverpool Y.M. 'B'.

Back to the league, Palmerston, Electric Supply and Maghull have left the rest of us way behind. So far I have only mentioned the Palmerston players whenever they have dropped one, a 7-3 win over Maghull recently has just about clinched the top spot for this season. Now Arthur Land has popped in to spell off Bob Hudson for reserve duties it looks as though the club won't reach its true level until the °C' and °D' teams reach the Second Division as well.
