DIVISION 2 LES FRENCH

Congratulations to Vernon Sangster on their great achievement of getting two teams into the first division at their first attempt. Jewish 'A' provided stiff opposition, keeping the issue open until the penultimate week, when the Sangster first team beat Bath St.'A' 8-2. The Sangster 'A' team (the older lot) had sealed things up the week before when beating Rafters 'A' 8-2. Their last game was against each other with the first team needing a 10-0 win to take the title. Their hopes were dashed in the first set when Les French beat Chris Ford. The match ended with a 6-4 win for the 'young-uns'. Paul Gittins won his two, John Greene beat Bill Harris and Val Franco convincingly.

Iwo vital factors in the 'A' team's success. Firstly their signing of Peter Flint in December and secondly my own switch to a combination bat at that time. My record up to then was 15 wins and 11 defeats. After losing two sets in the first two matches, I won 26 and lost 2 thereafter, for 74.2% overall, losing only to Mike Mercer of Rafters. Bill Harris was consistency itself, for a 83.3% record. Ian Wensley 63.1% and Val Franco 62.5%.

Paul Gittins was the leading scorer for the first team with 87.5% record, including two victories over Joe Green of E.E.'B'. Adam Bennion was next 73.1%, closely followed by John Greene 72.9% and Chris Ford 68.5%. Their failure to win the title could be put down to poor performances against CADWA, drawing and then losing the return 6-4 and also to a 6-4 defeat by Eng.Elec.'B', without Joe Green. On the credit side they had two great 8-2 wins over Jewish 'A', the second being a great match. Chris Ford, improving rapidly during the season, was the star with two straight wins over Roy Bradbury 15-13 and Jim McMillan 17-17.

The 'A' team also beat Jewish 'A' 7-3, with good wins for Les over Roy Bradbury 7-17 and Ian Burrows 17-10, to add to Peter Flint's double over McMillan and Hudson.

In the return match Jewish forced a draw. Ian beat me this time, 19 in the third, and with a good double for Jim McMillan over Bill 14-12 and Ian Wensley 15 in the third a win looked on the cards. Bill Harris beat Roy Bradbury for the first time to save the day. Peter won his two again.

Jim McMillan was Jewish's top man with 79.3%, followed by Bob Hudson 75% and Roy Bradbury 71.4%, Ian Burrows 63%.

At the other end of the table, with Trinity 'A' and Y.M.C.A.'B' doomed for some time, it developed into a triangular battle between CADWA, Colonsay, and Bath St.'A' to avoid the drop. Rafters 'A', at one time under serious threat, started turning out Mike Mercer for a series of matches. He was undefeated, the team sped to safety.

CADWA ended up with a series of defeats, including a vital 9-1 defeat by Colonsay in which their only success was a win for Ken Hartley over Dave Riley. In fact

they played Colonsay twice, the first match resulting in a 6-4 defeat, Ken winning three sets and Irevor Hughes beating John O'Sullivan. Colonsay fought hard near the end with a good 7-3 win over Palmerston 'A' and a great 4-6 scoreline against Jewish, however, they joined CADWA in the bottom four. Bath St.'A' just escaped following their re-ranking of Peter Ross and Mal Cray. John Letch ended with 36.4% and Mike Moran an unexplicable 28.1%. In fact, Bath St. might not have survived had it not been for the generosity of Alan Biggs, who agreed to play a walk-over match, saving them 2 sets and also a fine performance from Mike in winning his two singles against John Greene and Adam Bennion in an 8-2 defeat by V.S.

Maghull 'A' slipped badly, fielding reserves on many occasions. Mick Allen stopped playing in the new year and Ted Birch kept coming back from on top of the Andes in Peru to play his matches. Ted ended up with 73.8 and was the mainstay of the team along with Alan Chase who had 71.1%, Dave Newton had 47.8%.

The Police team ended the season on an unhappy note on learning of the proposed transfer of Steve Baker to Yorkshire. Steve, on his short stay with us, made a lot of friends with his quality play and pleasant personality. I'm sure that I'm speaking for everybody in wishing him well in his new surroundings. Steve ended with 71.7%. Dave Crispin had a disappointing season by his standards, ending with 60%. Tom Purcell, always difficult to beat ended with 36% and captain Don Chalkley had 37.5%.

Electric Supply also climbed high in the table, with Peter Carney in great form later on to end with 59%. Alan Biggs was their most successful player with 64.6%, Alan Cameron 50%.

Many people have said to me that they thought that this was the strongest second division that they could ever remember. If you look at some of the averages below 50% and reflect upon the known qualities of the players, you'll see what I mean.

Jack Letch beat Ted Birch, with Dave Cunningham recording a victory over Alan Chase.

Another candidate for the best match of the season was CADWA's 7-3 defeat by Palmerston 'A'. four sets ended 19 or deuce in the third with nine sets containing a 19 or deuce game. Mike Mahoney, 54%, won two for Palmerston and Trevor Hughes, 55.6% the same for CADWA. Neil Jennings was Palmerston's top scorer with 62.5%.

I'd like to close with a tribute to Bill Harris, whose support, enthusiasm and never-ending efforts have been such an important factor in enabling our club to bring two teams from the fifth division to the first in successive seasons.

I mean it this time, definitely no more predictions. I could of course claim that I got it right first time. Anyway Bootle fully deserve to be our champions, and in the end had a comfortable 9 points margin over Plessey. Although they beat Argot 6-4, Courtaulds then lost to Vagabonds 7-3 (Owen and Barnes 2 each) and drew with Maghull (Bulmer 2).

Argot finished fourth just 3 points behind Courtaulds, and they have been involved in some interesting matches. They managed four points off Bootle thanks to fine performances from Billy Hargreaves who beat Lawrence Kenwright 21-18, 13-21,21-18, Geoff Blackburn who beat John McLoughlin 21-14,10-21,21-19 and Dave Williams who beat John Tsang. They were again in top form when they convincingly beat Vagabonds 8-2. It can't be very often that Bobby Owen and Ted Barnes fail to register a singles win between them. The unpredictability of our game was emphasised however when Maghull beat Argot 7-3 despite the fact that No.1 John Armstrong failed to win a singles. In fact he lost to Hargreaves 20-22,2-21!! (somebody will now tell me that this is a misprint). Chris Roberts and Ray Tagg won all their games for Maghull.

Maghull and Vagabonds finished on equal points and can both be pleased with their seasons. Vagabonds took the honours 6-4 in the January meeting. Maghull won only two singles but their doubles play saved them from heavier defeat.

At the other end of the division, Irinity and Wavertree Labour were relegated. Allan Hall's form throughout the season was impressive and he added the names of Harry Nelson, Barry Mounsey and John Armstrong to his list of victims. Arthur Birch had a fine second half and can be well pleased with wins over Sue Anderson, Jerry Richardson, Roger Bennion and Chris Roberts. Another player to have an excellent finish to the season was Mal Clark of Trinity who seemed to get a new lease of life winning 8 of his last 14 singles. His victims included Steve Graham and Ray Lussey of Jewish, Mike Elson and Doug Ridgeway.

Bath St. and Eng.Electric finished on 89 points with Police just one point ahead. Electric beat Bath St. 6-4, Rob Peverall and Colin Fyles winning 2 each, but in a disappointing second half they surprisingly lost 9-1 to Jewish. Bath St. as ever, used an amazing number of players during the season, 10 on the scorecards I have at the moment. John Watson, Ray Howard, Tony Roberts and Tony Kendall appeared to be the most regular. These four thrashed Police 9-1 but went down 8-2 to Jewish.

The lads from Argot have kindly brought the following games to my attention. In the Argot v Colonsay match which ended 5-5, Dave Goodwin beat Geoff Blackburn 6-21,21-16,24-22; Mike Elson beat Brian Leeson 21-19,19-21,21-18; first doubles Blackburn and Elson v Nelson and Leeson went to Argot 23-21,25-23 but not to be outdone Colonsay in the shape of Piper and Goodwin beat Hargreaves and Ward 15-21,21-19,25-23. Against Police, Geoff Blackburn was again suffering in the third 19-21,21-19,18-21 to George Wright, but Dave Williams beat Alan Wood 21-19,12-21,22-20.

There isn't much to report on the two Aigburth teams as the 6-4 scoreline in favour of the first team illustrated when they met. The first four at the top of the score card went to Aigburth 'A' at the cost of R.Forshaw and A.Crist but Brian Aldred and Eric Wood picked up two apiece - both doubles went to Aigburth first team. Bath St's.'D' and 'E' teams have both experienced a mid-season shuffle of players, although one of them may be doomed for relegation. It is quite out of character for Job Centre to give games away, as they must be one of the keenest teams in the league and have managed to attract some very useful players to their squad, if they can keep them all until next season they must be a very good bet for promotion, although they will have to do so without the help of Sylvia Graham for much of the season as she and Dave have decided to produce a team of their own. In my 17 years as club secretary I have never known him miss a match. His record in this respect will never be surpassed. To imply that he is a cheat drags those concerned and their club to the very lowest level.

We won because our players went to this match determined to win. They lost because they thought they just had to turn up and the cup was theirs for the asking. I am proud to be able to say this was our greatest ever victory gained for us by the determination of our players and the leadership of their experienced, dedicated and competitive captain. Unfortunately, it was marred by a disgraceful exhibition of bad sportmanship.

I cannot tell a lie. The 1956/57 handbook that I said pushed itself to the fore

in a previous magazine, was not mine - I realised this when I came to put it away. It was the LEAGUE handbook that Gordon Brownlee (Maghull) passed on to me, Gordon also passed on a Bootle YMCA handbook. Despite having no direct connection with the Y.M. I always had a soft spot for the club. After reading the handbook my admiration knows no bounds.

My only connection with the wooden hut (a big one) in Stanley Road was of course table tennis. You went in and turned right and there were what appeared to be hundreds of youngsters queueing up for the first two tables and doing everything wrong from a table tennis point of view — on the third table a more sedate group doing most things right in table tennis. You then pokes your nose through a large curtain and you played your match, and enjoyed it despite the squabbles over whose turn it was etc., on the other side.

Being 6'3" I have always been allergic to little fellas on the other side of the table especially if they hit hard and often, that is probably why I distinctly remember playing Ron Rumjahn at Clubmoor (his dad was Number 1) and Gordon Birch at Bootle Y.M. The latest was Les Molyneaux (Wav.Labour) about a year ago. I was fortunate to miss Adam Bannion (Vernon Sangster) on the way up, but I agree with Les French there are great similarities between Adam and the Birch character.

But back to the Y.M. it catered for all sorts and sizes of youth activities apart from 4 table tennis teams camping for instance was looked after by Brian Crolley of English Electric and there were 17 other sporting and social activities. There is a photograph of the Bootle Y.M. Div.2 Championship side in Gordon's handbook with no names.

Names we know from the Bootle Y.M. stable are Wally Allanson, Gordon Birch and Brian Crolley all of English Electric, Alan Timewell (Rafters), Roger Bennion (Vernon Sangster), Gordon Brownlee (Maghull), Albert Harris the current Everton goalkeeper at that time played for them. Ian Rogerson, and Fred Cadwallader were well known Bootle names of the past. Undoubtedly the best known was Ralph Gunnion who at his peak was near the top of the English Rankings with more than a few international caps, although unfortunately for us he gained most of his fame after moving to Birmingham. A good story about Ralph, when English Elec. were at their peak a few seasons ago, Linnets were also having a very good run with Frank Thomas and his Blackburn contingent. Jimmy Green had Ralph on his books and decided to bring him up here at his own expense from Birmingham to crunch the Electric champs. Gordon Birch beat him two straight!

The Y.M. finished as we knew it when the local councillors decided to pull down the hut and a new warden let his religious principles overcome humanitarian needs and the requirements of the youth of the area.
