EDITORIAL

The tournaments, the cup finals and league positions have been and gone, we just have the A.G.M. to look forward to !?

What have we to look back on – the girls did us proud again, Keith won the big one again – a couple of promising young players on the horizon and Justine going from strength to strength.

The Cup finals were not the greatest because apart from one they all had firm favourites. Multi league players are just fine for the individual player, but for teams and secretaries they are quite a pain. The players who want more games get them at a competitive level – teams get a player they need and want – so everything is fine until nights clash and then cancellations, pleadings and arrangements come to the fore which cover a multitude of sins during the season. Unfortunately it happened to our major game of the season – the Readman Cup final – it so happened thanks to some spirited play by the losers it did not turn out a farce but not in the class of some of the great finals we have seen, and we expect to see at the game of the season.

Walkovers also create problems in the main due to match night changes. It's tragic for table tennis when matches are not played but more so when they affect promotion or relegation. I suppose you could ban change of nights but that would probably mean losing a team.

Can you see an answer to either problem?

Leaders from the start and never having been stretched or under pressure, Wav. Labour finished comfortable champions. Consistency over the past few seasons, which always saw them in with a chance, has now brought its reward for long serving captain Roy Smith, and team mates Dave Roberts, Alan Timewell, Rob Bevan assisted in the later stages by Steve Green. Congratulations to all of them, three of whom are veterans. Where, we ask, have all those younger players gone?

Runners-up, were Wav. Lab. 'A' who can look back with satisfaction on a very successful season. Unfancied cup contenders and unfancied in the league stakes they were faced with a hard cup draw. They emerged as Readman Cup winners and then added the runner-up spot. On their way to the Cup Final they defeated Liv. Y.M., their own 1st team and Cadwa and no w/over into the Final. I wonder when an 'A' team last defeated their own 1st team and then went on to win this Cup. In the Final they easily disposed of their opponents, Bootle J.C. who were without two of their regular team due to the curse of our League, players with commitments in too many leagues. On this occasion it was Preston which was considered by them to have a higher priority than Liverpool. Congratulations to Mike Tierney, Gary Watson, Bernie Wentworth and Steve Green. After a one season return from University, Bernie is off to distant parts.

Looking at times possible Cup contenders and a good bet for runners-up, and at other times a good bet for relegation, Cadwa failed to fulfil any of their main hopes and had to settle for a 3rd place well adrift of Wav. 1st and 'A'. They had to call on reserves too many times which cost them valuable points and also had its effect on relegation matches. Once again this was due to the priority factor. With greater commitment to their club and this League, 2nd place, perhaps even lst., was a possibility.

Much fancied Liv. Y.M. had to settle for an early exit from the cup and 4th place. Hampered by the loss of Peter Lee and an injury to Mike Mahoney which must have affected his game, they faced a mountain too big to climb. Peter's enforced absence was their biggest blow for they missed his determination and encouragement. It was left to Mr Consistency, Keith Williams, to salvage their endeavours and ensure they finished in a reasonable position.

Colonsay could only manage 5th place in a season when they were expected to be the frontrunners and a strong bet for the championship. Instead they struggled along the victims of players only willing to turn out when it suited them. Their only consistent player was Rob Lowe, and he was not in their top three rankings.

Much was expected of Bootle J.C. after their Readman Cup successes of last season which included the scalp of Wav. Labour, and this whilst only a 2nd Div. team. Somewhere along the way their bubble burst and results started to fluctuate. They finished with a total of eight defeats which included a 10/0 w/over to our Walkover Champions, Eng. Elec. 'A'. They beat them 7-3 in the return encounter and a similar score in the claimed match would have pushed them up one place and seen Elec. 'A' relegated. On the credit side, although committed in other leagues, they turned out on a regular basis with the Cup Final being a lone situation.

Moving to the lower half, Bath St. finished in a creditable 7th place with Ken Jackson again being their best player. Few 1st division players can afford to relax when playing Ken and his whirlwind game often demoralises his opponents. If we had a 'Mr Nice Guy' competition, then I reckon Ken would be a strong bet to win it.

Eng. Elec. and G.P.T. both finished with 91 points, although Eng. Elec's. total included a 10.0 w/over which made them runners-up in the w/over championship to their "A" team. Both of

them having claimed a w/over against Bootle Y.M. who may be forgiven if they feel Eng. Elec. have a grudge against them. From champions last season, to relegation candidates this season, is quite a drop. We all know the reason why, but what we should be asking ourselves is why should we put up with players using our League for their own ends? One thing Eng. Elec. did prove, as did Wav. Lab., that this is not, as many consider, a younger persons game, for they have two established veterans, Ted Birch and Alan Chase, always capable of taking most and stretching the best. Ted sometimes appears to run out of steam, but is full of craft and guile, plus 150% endeavour. For them the season really revolves around the Veterans Cup which they duly won again and earn our congratulations. The Final was won in the record time of 1 hour 10 mins. leaving their opponents, Cadwa, with little more than a medal for their efforts, and host Stan Harvey with a scramble to produce his usual high standard of refreshments. Well done, Eng. Elec. and Stan Harvey, the perfect host.

For G.P.T. it was a steady season with some good results achieved by endeavour and aided by a regular team using four players. They were determined to hold onto their 1st division status and comfortably achieved their aim.

Eng. Elec. 'A' also hung onto their 1st division status for at least one more season and achieved this with the assistance of two claimed 10/0 w/overs. Probably the easiest thing to find is a reason for claiming a w/over and no doubt they have plenty. Will theirs stand up to the fact that one was claimed at a crucial late period? I don't know. What I do know, is, that I just happen to believe that the aim is to complete your quota of matches by competing against all your opponents. Any Wav. Lab. player will confirm my views on this aspect. Sorry, Fred, but I have to say that in my opinion, survival at all costs replaced survival by our own endeavours. I don't know the facts, and can only go by my own views on w/overs, particularly crucial ones.

We lose Liv. Y.M. and Bootle Y.M. to the 2nd Division. There was never really anything down for Bootle YM for they lacked the strength and ability to survive at this level. They have youth on their side and will have gained experience from this season. The loss of Y.M. 'A' will be keenly felt for they have been an established team for many years and perhaps this marks the end of an era. Aware from the start of the task ahead they gave their all to retain 1st div. status. With Peter Lee becoming available during the final matches, they dropped Harry Johnston and put Peter in. Their results picked up aided by his inclusion and assisted by Cadwa who chose their final match to field a weak team against a relegation possible, but it was all too no avail and they go down by the narrow margin of 5 points. It is certain that they will be looking at the w/overs claimed by Elec. 'A' with a very jaundiced view. These would have made no difference to the plight of Bootle Y.M. but certainly contributed to the relegation of Liv. YM 'A'. I did hear that their decision to change their team in a late effort to avoid relegation has led to internal strife which may have had an adverse effect on them, but the club has always got to be the first priority and must take precedence over other matters. Having glossed briefly through the teams and their placings we need to inspect the impact which players and match results allied to team turn-outs have had on many of the season's issues. This includes some outstanding performances and lone wins. We can start with Cadwa who used eleven players and produced in and out results because of that, and gave away a lot of sets in the process. Against Bath St. GPT. Liv YM 'A' and Bootle YM 'A' they fielded weakened teams. They duly lost to Bath St. 7-3 with Neil Gravener being a lone triple winner. They beat GPT 7-3 with reserve Justine Thomas dropping two and Bob Edwards picking up the 3rd with a win. Another weak team of three reserves against Liv. YM 'A' resulted in an 8-2 defeat with a double from Ken Hartley saving them from an ignominious 10-0. One week earlier against the other relegationists they could only manage a draw. Reserve Justine Thomas, dropping her three and Bootle reserve John Higham chipping in with a 2 straight win

straight win over Alex Bryce. Wav. Lab. got the two reserve treatment and it was left to Ken Hartley to save face for Cadwa with a lone win over Rob Bevan. Just to show it was not all give and no take, Liv Y.M. turned up with only one player. Dave Tagg, who did a 'Ken Hartley' and achieved a lone win over reserve Justine Thomas. Should YM 'A' have gone down? They will think not and point to the two w/overs previously mentioned and conveniently forget the 8 sets gifted to them by a weak Cadwa team. They will also point to their efforts against Eng. Elec. winning 6-4 with doubles for Peter Lee and Ahmed Thabet. Also against Bath St. four sets won with two more doubles from Peter and Ahmed. A further 3 three sets taken off G.P.T. when with Peter not available, and Harry Johnston perhaps declining to play, they called on George Smith who responded with a win and Peter Taylor chipped in with a double. Against Bootle I.C. they picked up two more thanks to another double from Ahmed, one of his victims being Andrew Clark. They also got three sets off high flyers. Wav. Lab. 'A'. Ahmed and Peter getting one each with the other coming from the doubles. They played Bootle J.C. again in the final run-in and picked up three more with a double from Peter Lee and one from Peter Taylor. They also got a draw against their 1st team who were one short. Despite these sterling efforts they could only manage a draw in the crucial match against fellow travellers Bootle Y.M.

Let us have a look at Eng. Elec. 'A'. They recorded an excellent 8-2 win against G.P.T. but lost to Bath St. by the same score, Fred 'walkover' Pheysey, getting their two sets. Cadwa got in on the act again by providing 3 sets from a reserve in a 5-all draw. Against Liv Y.M. Harry Harrison chipped in with a valuable lone win over Dave Tagg. Against Wav. Lab. it was Captain Fred's turn to chip in with a valuable lone win over Steve Green. No co-operation from their 1st team beset with their own problems, but Fred and Harry chipped in with two more valuable points. The crunch match versus Liv. YM 'A' left them reeling being beaten 8-2 with another sterling performance from Captain Fred as their singles winner. Once again Fred did his heroic captain act with a double against Wav. Lab. which included another win over Steve Green, just to prove the first was no fluke. They took three off Bootle J.C. with Harry Harrison getting in on the doubles win act beating Nick Miller and Chris Spedding, and Frank (1st div. next season) Brady getting the other.

For Bootle YM 'A' it was a struggle and conceding 20 sets didn't help, but it was not all doom and gloom. Derek Sullivan being a lone winner against Colonsay, beating Rob Lowe. Jason Killip going one better by being a lone winner against Lab. 'A' with a win over Mike Tierney and putting the icing on his cake with a great win over Andy Clark (Bootle J.C.) the following week. They also beat Liv. Y.M. who were again one short, with Derek Sullivan winning two and Jason Killip one. Jason got into the act yet again with another lone win against Bath St. his victim this time being Ian McElwee. Perhaps the best wins were recorded by Les Pilkington when he picked up the only two sets against GPT with two good wins over Paul Price and Trevor Owens. Great stuff from a player catapulted into the lst division. Consistency allied to a regular team eventually won the day for Eng. Elec. 'A' but that won't stop Y.M. 'A' and perhaps even Bootle Y.M., wondering would the playing of those two 10-0 w/overs have changed things in their favour.

To finish, a few other good wins. For Bath St., Ken Jackson recorded a double over Rob Bevan and Alan Timewell for his teams only sets. Against Wav. Lab. in a 9-1 defeat, Ted Birch was a lone winner, but the score did not really do justice to a hard fought match. For G.P.T Trevor Owens was a lone winner against Liv. Y.M. The following week Bob Edwards and Ray Lavin starred with a singles each off Alan Timewell to record their teams only sets. G.P.T. have had a good season with plenty of good individual performances to complement an all round team performance. Against Eng. Elec. in a surprising 8-2 defeat, Bootle J.C. had to rely on a double from Andy Clark over Mike Allen and Ted Birch for their meagre sets haul. Earlier in the

season, Alan Chase earned himself an early Christmas present with a lone win against Wav. Lab. by taking a hard won set off Alan Timewell. Alan seems to keep all his best performances against fellow veterans for the 'Closed' tournament.

I have tried to highlight as many as possible and also look closely at the problems which arise when clubs are unable to regularly field their best team. I leave you to ponder on it all and perhaps if you are one of those players over committed, whose absence in crucial matches may have affected important issues, you will ask yourself, have you been fair to this League, your club and your team-mates. If you have missed out on a mention because you let a noteworthy win s1 ip away then perhaps it will encourage you to try harder next season. The championship and relegation issue are often tight and a lone win can often be expensive to your opponents or valuable to your team.

Talking of next season, already my ear is being bent with news of player moves. Knowing the strange views some players hold on the meaning of loyalty and their belief that they and their game are more important than a mere club, I let it pass over me. One day, I hope, clubs will tire of being subjected to what happened to Eng. Elec. and others before them and get together to agree a Code of Conduct which would put a stop to it.

Congratulations again, to Champions, Wav. Lab. Runners-up and Readman Cup winners, Wav. Lab. 'A'., Veteran Cup Winners, Eng. Elec.

Yet another season over with and the the race for the 3rd division title won by Bath Street with Bootle JC in second place.

Bath Street also won the Hyde Cup, beating Bootle in the final after two drawn games and a count back on individual games won. The top teams were chased all season by G.P.T. and Maghull, GPT would have done better if their top players had been available for more games, but Maghull after yet another near miss must now be getting fed up finishing 3rd or 4th every season.

5th & 6th were those perennial runners-up Waterloo & English Electric "D" (the Julie Prince Electric), these two teams finish in the same positions every season but just cannot clinch a higher place.

The other top junior in this division is Ritchie Beatty, Bootle's No 1, Ritchie is another fine young player who is now showing more maturity and taking control of his temperament. He does have an out-going personality but has an enthusiasm for the game of TT, well done Ritchie – keep it going in 91.

This seasons stars - not counting the No 1 players who are all star players, but the lesser players who pick up lots of team points in a season. My list would contain:- Ken Strahan, Chris Roberts, Ian Wensley, Phil Musgrove, Ray Hibbs, Jim Clewitt, George Wright, Pete Holmes, George Higham, John Watson, Rob Conley and Ro Craddock.

Wouldn't it be great to get back to playing in any order on the team sheet?

No more knowing who you were going to play in every match, no more games that have the same result year in - year out. Being able to change the line up at will is a tremendous tactic and adds to the skills of captaincy, as well as enabling players to play against different players in other teams.

Our No 4 for example, often wants to play up the order against certain teams and would do so if it were possible.

Let's start with the battle of the giants, Bath St against Bootle, their 2nd league game finished the same as all their meetings, a 5-5 draw. Norman Challoner was the man of this match, his defence was just too good for loopers Ritchie Beatty and Steve Nield. Bootle captain Dave Graham got his serve and loop game working to beat Fred Bainbridge by 21-16, 21-7. and with Steve, also won a very good doubles over Fred and John Watson. Roger Neal won his usual two singles by sheer hard work against Pete Ross and John.

greatest fan is her Dad Bill who does a tremendous job of coaching and driving. Mr Quietly Consistant won his usual three in this 7-3 victory for Cadwa, George is playing better than ever now as I found out to my cost this season. You've made me break a 20 odd year rule never to mention myself, well done Geo.

A great game to watch was Ritchie Craggs 15,19,18 loss to Phil Musgrove when Cadwa beat E 7-3, the hall wasn't quite big enough for Ritchie but he covered the rest of it with his roll forehand defence and gave Phil lots of practise against high lobs.

Julie Prince had two big hitting games when Eng. Elec beat YMCA 7-3, first of all hitting John Henshaw's dead bat dummy top spin and then hitting Mark Vincent's Hi-spin low speed forehands, the game with John was very close and could have tipped either way. Jimmy Clewitt picking up YM's points with his all action game, any tips on how to play against Jim should be passed to the author.

Electric Supply have had a pretty good season with a team of top spin hitters who play with 100% effort. Ian Turner and John Moore have had the best results and I would expect Ian to move up the order next season. Ian's win over the classy Martin Hunter (Colonsay 4-6) was a terrific performance, when Ian smashes, the ball doesn't come back. Sad news for Supply was Rob Conley's broken wrist sustained in the match with E Electric just as Rob was back to his form of the Wally Lewis, Les Evans, Dennis Underhill days. Best wishes for a speedy recovery Rob.

Mega Star Bill Clayton proved that his first win over one of this division's best players Alan Walton was no fluke, Bill repeated the win 18,18,19. How the heck he does it, I just don't know!.

Waterloo 7 Cadwa 3 thats a good win, who won Cadwa's two singles, need you ask- George again. The two Alan's Walton and Reid picked up their usual 5, this is why Waterloo are so difficult to beat, when you add the class and all round skill of Ray Hibbs and Ken Nelson, they are a formidable side.
