EDITORIAL

We start with a spot or two of good news. Firstly we are having three digests this Season - one up on the last two Seasons. At the risk of repeating myself - the Magazine is yours, you can make it interesting by discussing or writing in the Digest as well as sorting it out in the Clubroom. Most players look to see if they get a mention - so have a go if you have a point to make and your name very much in print. The other good news is that we have a full Fifth Division - not a piece of news to hit the headlines, but it could be a sign of better times and very good news for the Division Five gang. Another personal item which may or may not interest our coaching contingent, we had a couple of tables for sale and we have had three enquiries taking in best part of thirty players. As far as the coaching fratemity are concerned not a youthful potential champion amongst them. They are all eighteen to forty five group - all from factories. Is this a potential source of new players and, if it is, are we interested. (We sold both the tables) any more for sale?

The new season brings back a three team club, Eng. Electric, the last one being Wav. Lab. until their 'B' team were relegated in 1988/89. The arrival of Cadwa 'A' brings up another two team club. A position not previously enjoyed by Cadwa for many years. Player moves sees Paul Hutching moving to G.P.T. and Jason Killip to Bath St. Labour 'A' have introduced Wirral Jnr Mark Newns and there is news of a new signing by Eng. Elec. who have signed on Natasha Williams, No.l. Welsh Jnr. girl who also doubles as the Welsh No.l. woman player. This at the age of 15. Having seen her play recently at the Cleveland Junior I feel certain she will soon make her mark. Good news for Natasha and Eng. Elec. Her debut saw wins over Mike Keane and Jason Killip which have already put her in the spotlight. Bad news for Eng. Elec. and the whole League is the closure of the Club around March '92; victims of today's big business profit profile. With the demise of Wav. Labour Club still a strong possibility we could find two big clubs without premises before the season ends. Grim news, for suitable premises are difficult to find.

Eng. Elec. 'B' having got here the hard way via a steady climb through the divisions will be wanting to make their newly won status safe. Although at present lurking near the bottom, I expect them to comfortably avoid relegation. They started off in grand style by thrashing their 'A' team 9-1; the white wash being narrowly avoided when John Evans beat. Keith Miller. They followed up with a draw against Cadwa and had an early hand in the Championship battle when Frank Brady took 2 sets, beating Peter Lee and Mike Mahoney. He also took Keith Williams to 3. With a further four sets taken from Bath St. they can look forward with confidence to the future. Their team-mates in the 'A' Team can only look forward to life at the bottom and a season fraught with the spectre of relegation. Of course, there could be a life-saver if a few w/overs drift their way to boost their total. The 'Old Firm' are still in charge of the 1st Team and they look set for a middle area position. They beat a weakened Colonsay team 6-4 and had a draw in their 'Vets' match against Bath St. Only non-vet present, Mike Allen, obviously over-rawed by finding himself in such exalted company being the only player not to win a set.

The other newcomers, Cadwa 'A' are finding it hard work at this level but their arrival has brought some much needed jnr talent into the division. The div. will benefit from this challenge, as will the youngsters, and we are certain to see some leading players humbled. Biggest problem is identifying just who is in their 1st. and 'A' team. Of the jnrs. Phil Musgrove looks the player most likely to cause an upset, but the best result to date must go to Ian Miller who recorded a lone win for his team over Alan Timewell. Both promoted teams now having had a say in the Championship battle. Will they stay up? I hope so, but have to mark them down as a strong relegation possibility.

Their 1st team are doing well and challenging strongly for a final 3rd place, but as with the 'A' team and Colonsay seem to have many problems in respect of player availability. This problem, when it affects strong teams, can, and often does, have an adverse effect on Championship and Relegation issues. With a regular full strength team they could have been pushing Liverpool Y.M. and Wav. Lab. very strongly. It borders on the ridiculous when 1st div. teams show player numbers such as 19; 13; 15; 12; on their scorecards.

Bath St. appear to have dropped Ian McElwee for new signing Jason Killip who left Bootle Y.M. because they were relegated and he wanted 1st. div. play. I would have thought the best way to achieve that aim would be to get your team promoted again. All

depends on your point of view as to what has the highest priority, loyalty or ambition. Being, perhaps, old-fashioned, I believe players owe to their club loyalty and are entitled to expect loyalty in return. A view obviously not shared by Bath St. or Jason. Be that as it may, the team will enjoy an untroubled season and cause a few upsets. Jason doing his share of that by taking a lone set from Alan Timewell and Ken Jackson did likewise against Y.M. by taking a lone set from Peter Lee. Bath St. may well be feeling it should have been more than one set and 9-1 did not do justice to their efforts. Six sets went to three and Bath St. lost them all. An unusual feature of the match being that Keith Williams went to three in all four of his sets and won them, with six of the games going to deuce. Quite a match for both teams with Y.M. being thankful they only lost one set, and Bath St. feeling 'Lady Luck' had not looked too kindly on their efforts.

Strengthened by the arrival of Paul Hutchings will mean a safe position for G.P.T. and his regular haul of sets is certain to improve the performance of his team-mates relieved of the pressure of relegation and encouraged by the knowledge of a lot of guaranteed sets which in turn will improve their approach. Bootle J.C will also be safe in a middle table position the promise of better things hinted at when they arrived on the 1st div. scene not having been fulfilled. They lack the in-depth strength needed for a sustained attempt on the Championship. They will always be in amongst the sets as they have demonstrated with wins against Cadwa 'A'; Lab. 'A'; Bath St., a good win 7-3 with Andy Clark winning his three only to become an early victim to Phil Musgrove in the match v Cadwa which Bootle J.C. won 6-4. They went down to Colonsay 7-3 with Nick Miller having a good win against Chris Ford. All good results, but not good enough for any kind of challenge.

Colonsay again find themselves languishing outside the top three and are again having problems turning out a regular full strength team. This led to two early defeats at the hands of Cadwa 'A' and Eng. Elec. with both inflicting 6-4 defeats on them. Their full strength team of Stuart Richards, Chris Ford and Rob Lowe producing a 10-0 against Elec. 'A' and 7-3's against Bath St. and Bootle J.C. For Eng. Elec. Mike Corcoran had an outstanding win against Stuart 22/20 in the 3rd. and Mike Keane did likewise for Bath St. 17 in the 3rd.

Shorn of the services of Bennie Wentworth has blunted the thrust of Lab. 'A' but newcomer Mark Newns is settling down well and along with Gary Watson will pose a threat to most teams. Gary recently recording one of his best wins when he beat Keith Williams in his team's 6-4 defeat by Y.M. which gave their 1st team a good lift in the championship stakes. They won't repeat last season's excellent result of Cup winners and 1st div. runners-up, but will be up amongst the front-runners and looking for a good cup run.

That leaves us with Liverpool Y.M. and Wav. Lab. A re-vitalised Liverpool Y.M. making a determined challenge for the title, the return of Peter Lee having given them the required shot in the arm. Early indications are that it could be a very close finish and Y.M. must be feeling this is their turn after so many seasons of falling short of their target. The result of their two clashes will have a bearing on the final outcome and the first one came in Week 2. Presumably the change to a 12 teamchart was responsible for this change in match order which brought the two contenders face to face so early in the season. With the same three plus Steve Green, as their squad, Wav. also set out their stall early and came out of the match with a 7-3 win. Six sets went to three and Steve Green was at his flamboyant best and took his three sets, inflicting on Keith an early defeat. Keith took his other two,

Mike Mahoney adding the 3rd with a two straight win over Dave Roberts. I can't see either of them managing to open up a big gap at any time and it will be late in the season before the final position will take shape. Much may depend on the teams turned out by other front-runners such as Colonsay and Cadwa and their next clash which is booked for the early date of Thursday 12th December, when most of you may not yet have seen this first issue.

No blank week for the 1st Round Cups, Quarters and Semis split and 1st division contenders meeting early. What has happened to normality? One small point in respect of scorecards which few seem to get right. The match number shown should be that in the handbook. If you play Match No.3. at the end of the season it is still match No.3 not Match No. 22, The brackets on the line for the team name are to show your Fixture Key number and not, as many do, 'A'; 'B' etc. This is the top division and your cards should reflect that standing in that they should be correctly completed. Your team may not be first in the League table but you can make it 1st in the scorecard table by ensuring it is correct in every section and that includes your current record. This may appear trivial and unimportant to you, but to Wyn and Eddie Cameron who compile the results it is of the utmost importance. Give it a try, it won't cost you anything.

DIVISION 2

What a strange division, within the first 6 weeks of the season there have been no less than 5 walk-overs claimed from the 20 cards I have at this time. What an appalling inditement of the interest shown by some of our clubs and what a mockery it makes of the promotion/relegation issues within the division. I have some sympathy for the Police who have conceded 2 walk-overs to date, as their work patterns can make it difficult to raise a team on occasions, but I find it difficult to find reasons to explain why Bootle J.C. "A" failed to turn up against Bootle Y.M.C.A. or why Electric Supply (who expect to win the division) failed to appear against Bootle J.C. "A". The other team to fail to turn up for a match were M.C.Y.A. who have since withdrawn from the League.

Having got that off my chest time to look at how the division stands after 6 weeks, the top spot at the moment is held by Liverpool Y.M.C.A "A" and they look to be a very strong team but I will be surprised if they turn out as division winners, but a good bet for a promotion spot. In 2nd place are Bootle J.C. "A" the signing of Julian Quirk, Steve Fay and Derek Sullivan have strengthened the team into potential promotion candidates, and had they not conceded the walk-over to Bootle Y.M.C.A. they would almost certainly be in top spot.

Third placed at this time are Electric Supply who will certainly win the division if they can consistently turn out their strongest team, the trouble with using players like Mal McEvoy, Peter Flint and Ken Connor is that they are playing in other leagues and tend to pick and choose which games they will play in and that can prove fatal for promotion chances. Bootle Y.M.C.A. are in 4th position but seem to be having problems turning out their strongest team each week a problem caused in no small way by having lost their full first team to other clubs during the closed season.

G.P.T. "A" are currently in 5th spot and look likely to finish the season in or near this position, whilst Colonsay with 2 teams in the division are really struggling, if loosing the services of 9 players for a variety of reasons isn't bad enough they lost the services of Gary Thornton-Allen after only two weeks of the season then where unable to play any home games for the first month of season due to building work at the school. Having

decided to split their strength across the two teams their main objective will be maintain both teams in the division.

Bath Street "A" are somewhat of an enigma, I would have expected them to be in a higher position as they are a very hard team to beat and are extremely competitive but at the time of writing they have lost 4 and drawn 2. Police as I have already mentioned have had great difficulty in fulfiling their fixtures but on paper they have a team to give anybody a run for their money. That leaves only English Electric "C" and Harold House to talk about and I have to say that I feel one of these two will be the unfortunate team to drop into the 3rd division next season. Only one team will be relegated this season with the withdrawal of M.C.Y.A. and on balance I feel that the most likely to loose out is Harold House, but then again I have been wrong before. Of course by the time you read this many more games will have been played and you may wonder what on earth I am prattling on about but that is the risk you take when you put pen to paper with only a small number of cards for guidance.

One final point to get you all talking, does anybody in the division have any idea of the rules governing service? If so why do the vast majority of players foul serve every time they are called upon to put the ball into play? Having umpired games at all levels all over the country I feel it is safe to say that the standard of serving in the Liverpool League is nothing short of diabolical. What can be so difficult about placing the ball on the flat palm of the free hand, projecting the ball near vertically for a minimum of six inches before striking the ball with the bat as it descends? ensuring that throughout the whole of the service action the ball and bat remain wholly above the playing surface and behind the end line. A rather simplistic explanation of the service rule but not a bad point to start with. It really is time that we all insisted that every player plays the game within the rules and not turn a blind eye to to quite deliberate attempts to ignore the very basic rules of the service law, after all nobody would expect to be awarded a point if they fail to return the ball successfully so why expect to be allowed to ignore other rules? Your comments would be welcome.

Look no further than Electric Supply 'B' for the Divisional Championship as Alan Biggs, Neil Jennings and Peter Carney remain unbeaten. Clearly this would be a competent 3rd Division team and anyone taking a set off this trio is guaranteed a very favourable future write up. So, let's go for it, fellow 'Fifties'.

Electric Supply benefit, too, from a very settled team with Arthur 'Hitter' Harrison, making up the quartet. Is there any truth in the rumour that Alan and Neil are leaving to join their 3rd Division Team? In a 'normal' Season, we at Wavertree Labour 'D' might have expected to be clear championship favourites. Especially with Sandie 'Seventeen Bats' Sanderson strutting his stealthy stuff'. Sandie has lost just twice, 19 and 11 to Neil Jennings and 13, 13, -22, in a humdinger to Richard Blackburne, playing for Harold House "C" is the shock of the Season so far.

This was a most impressive display of controlled forehand hitting by Ritchie, Mike Ashton (Labour) too, has lost just twice against Alan and Peter of Supply and, actually, had chances to bury Alan 2-0 in a tight second deuce game.

Waterloo 'A' are strong with Fraser Farquharson a committed exponent of the 3rd-Ball-Kill game. However he did come unstuck against the experienced Billy Holmes (Aigburth) 16 and 16, though he managed to shade Bill Leeming 16 in the 3rd. Waterloo team-mate John Forrest, is about as opposite in style as you can get with his clear, no-error combination play, but he too was outdone by Billy Holmes in what was a creditable double for the Aigburth number 2. Bill Spencer and Eugene Berger have made steady starts for Waterloo with Eugene particularly unfortunate in losing out to Labour's Sandie alter leading 20-16 in the 3rd.

Eddy Mosherhe has turned out for both TAG teams and is pledging revenge against myself and Mike Ashton (Labour) after 4 losing sets against us. The scores are getting closer and Eddy has good reason for optimism as he continues to improve.

Both TAGS are in credibly keen, none more so than Jamie McCafferty playing number 1 for the 1st team. He took Ken Miller (Harold House 'B') to 22 in the 3rd, and I shouldn't be surprised if he converts some close losses, to victories as the Season progresses. David Rudd (TAG) possesses a very strong backhand hit, perhaps the hardest in the division

overall. TAG 'A' seems slightly the stronger at the moment, perhaps helped by their travelling supporters club. I expect LIHE to maintain their middling position, but they seem to lack the strength in depth to make a top half push. I would back Vivien Smallwood against anyone in an open top-spin game where she is very strong on both flanks. Vivien did well to out hit Labour's John Reynolds, but succumbed to Mike Ashton's craft chiselling and, occasional, backhand top-spin. I am fascinated by Edmund Hung's classical penhold play for LIHE. He seems to play penhold as it 'should' be played and is very fast on his feet. However he is finding it hard to win in these early stages, but surely this will change.

Along with LIHE, Wavertree Labour 'E' have made a belated entry to the Season. This brings our strength to 12 teams and dare I say it, I get the feeling this time, that we will all finish. I certainly hope so, as it's the very least the regulars of this Division deserve.

Labour 'E' will struggle to avoid the bottom positions but I am assured by Ken Armson that their refreshments are top of the league. Well you can have your cake and eat it Ken. Ted Mandaluff hasn't quite got his game going yet, but there will be no surprise when he begins to make life very difficult for most with his consistent wooden bat play. Ken Armson celebrates 25 years as Club Secretary and it is perfectly fitting that he has a regular place when he has unfailingly over recent years, held squad positions to allow others a regular place. Ken Ray at Number 1, had a dramatic victory over John Reynolds 18 in the 3rd, in the Wavertree Derby. John wont lose many in this Division, though he admits to losing games he should really win. There isn't a better looping game in the Division. Reza Mirdamadi makes up the Labour 'E' team, in his 1st Season of League Table Tennis.
