Secretary's Report.

It seems these days that whenever I put pen to paper to write my reports, I have to start with sad news. This report is no different but I make no apology for it. The tragic and sudden death of Billy Proffitt must be a reminder to us all that we are only on this planet for a short time and we must therefore make the most of our lives. Billy was one of the fittest men I knew for his age which was just 61. I doubt many of us can say we keep ourselves as fit as Billy did. My thoughts, and those of the Management Committee, go to his wife and family, friends and clubmates. Billy served Fords TTC for as long as I can remember and he will be a hard act to follow. At the time of writing, Graham Reid, brother of the late departed Alan Reid, has stepped into Billy's shoes to run Fords TTC.

On a more cheerful note, I am glad to report that Arthur Upton, who has spent five or six weeks in hospital, may be allowed home soon and may in fact be home by the time you read this report. As far as I am aware Alex Gould is also doing quite well and is settled in his Nursing Home and looking forward to getting his electric wheel chair.

On a TT issue, how many of you throw the ball up six inches? I know we all try to throw it up six inches but we don't always get it right, myself included. It's not that we are trying to gain an unfair advantage; it's simply a habit we get into. Well the most recent proposal on the table at the ITTF AGM on 5th April 2002 is that we must throw the ball up twelve inches. At the time of writing it is only a proposal and it is expected to fail as there has not been enough time for the likes of the ETTA to ballot its members. By the time you read this article the result will be known. Assuming it does fail it doesn't mean it won't be on the agenda for a future AGM or SGM. Why change the rules of the game yet again you may ask? We already have the larger ball. It seems inevitable that all TT competitions, including League level, will soon be 11-up. We are about to see a change in the service rule from next September which states the ball must be thrown up in front of the body and not shielded in any way i.e., by the free arm. It is said, the twelve inch proposal would help underline the principal agreed at last years ITTF AGM and being confirmed this year, that with effect from September 2002 the receiver is able to see the service at the point of contact between the bat and the ball, thus outlawing 'shielded' services whereby sight of the ball when struck is obscured by the server's non-playing arm, body or clothing. It would also help prevent players obtaining extra spin and deception by throwing the ball back on to the bat during service. Currently some players during service bring the non-playing arm up together with the ball (i.e. it is difficult to judge exactly when they have 'thrown up'/released the ball, and sight of the ball may be shielded), or drop the non-playing arm from the ball to give the impression/illusion that they have thrown the ball up, and a higher throw-up would make it much harder for the server to gain an advantage in

these ways. However, with the changes in recent years to a bigger ball, scoring to 11-up and then to the service rule to prevent shielded services, grass roots players may feel that increasing the height of the service throw-up is a change too far or too soon. The proposal requires 75% (majority) of votes cast, but it is uncertain which way the 186 member national associations will vote. Having had little time to consider the implications, the ETTA are likely to be voting against.

So, what is your opinion? The next time you are practising why not try to throw the ball up twelve inches. Some players already do, therefore it won't make any difference to them. But for those players who don't, (and for those players who **unconsciously** throw the ball backwards), you may find that you lose control of the serve and give your opponent an easy ball to return. One thing is for sure: with all these changes we are all going to have to adjust our game and practice a lot more. It will also put more pressure on the umpire to ensure a legal serve is made. The twelve-inch serve may not come in straight away but if it doesn't, I wouldn't be at all surprised if it is in the near future.

Finally, the League AGM will take place at the end of May and I have noted that only one club has proposed a Rule amendment. I must assume therefore that you are all happy with the rules as they are!

2002 CLOSED CHAMPIONSHIPS

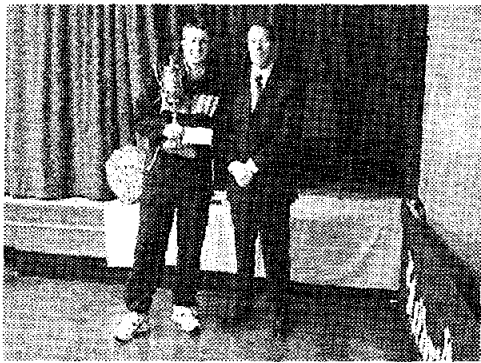
News of the untimely death of Bill Proffitt reached me as I was about to start this report and having worked with Bill at our coaching sessions and knowing what a staunch supporter he was of this event I felt I could not let his passing go without comment. Bill always played with zest but also enjoyment and was always ready and willing to help in any capacity. We will, I know, all miss him and I will also miss him at our coaching sessions as will Alan Biggs, Graham Rollinson and George Smith. Bill gave the coaching 100% support and his input will be sorely missed.

Our 2002 Championships were held on Bill's home ground as for some years he was a regular at Netherley SC with the 5-a-side football and for a short period Fords also played league matches at the Centre. For us it was a case of another first, and may well have been our last, as word is it is soon to be demolished to make way for Everton's new football academy. Those who played matches in the gym will possibly be pleased if it is because the lighting appeared to be inferior to that in the sports hall but this was an optical illusion due to the two different types of lighting. Some may be sceptical about this but Alan, Graham and George will confirm my view.

We strive always to improve our championships and this season was no exception in that everyone who entered last season received two entry forms by post, additional copies going to club secretaries. We also provided free hot drinks throughout the day, re-introduced a Plate competition for the Men's singles and provided a free buffet for all spectators on Finals Night. None of these proved to be very successful for entries were slow in coming the event taking place only because of the many late postal entries and numerous phone entries that found me still preparing paperwork on the eve of the event. Surprisingly the take up of hot drinks was quite low but we will persevere with this next year subject to this being allowed at the venue. Too many of our better players were missing on the day and our finals Night lacked its usual sparkle and this was reflected in the poorest attendance for some years and we also had a high waste food factor. The Plate competition also fell victim to the general malaise with quite a few pulling out, some leaving without first advising me they did not wish to be entered. This may have been partly due to competitors not having read their letter and so being unaware that this would take place. Those who did enter enjoyed the additional matches, the aim of any tournament being to give players plenty of matches. **Your views on these points and other changes you would like us to consider will assist us in tailoring our championships to suit your needs.**

We started the day with the O55 event played this time as a straight knockout the experiment with group play not having proved successful due to the time factor. This event frequently produces unexpected results and tight matches and so it was on this occasion with Alf Perry taking a starring role and disposing of No.2 seed, Peter Taylor -19,19 & 20. I believe he was trailing in the 3rd and pulled back to 20-all. In the semi against Ted Birch he was clearly drained by his efforts against Peter and lost 2 straight, 9 & 13. In the other semi No.1 seed Ken Jackson had a much tougher time against newcomer Dave Harse but also took it in 2 straight, 16 & 16 going on to wrest the title from Ted with a very comfortable 2 straight win 10 & 10.

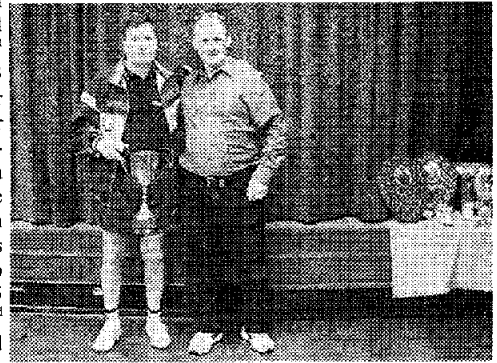
The Divisional event introduced a few years back to replace the mixed lower divisions event again failed to attract many entries the 2nd doing best with 20 entries with 11 for the 3rd and a combined 4/5th of 18 due to only three entries from D5. This was played in group format followed by a knockout, No.1 seed Colin Rourke, last years D3 champion beating last years D2 champion Ray Parkinson in the semis and newcomer Omid Khaiyat beating newcomer Dave Harse in the other semi and going on to beat Colin in a hard fought final 19 & 18. In the D3 event No.1 seed Les Molyneux was the winner of a hard fought semi against Matthias Poerschke 16, -17, 19 and in the other semi Les Gee defeated Alf Perry in yet another tremendous tussle 15, -19, 18 having previously knocked out No.2 seed John Higham. Les Gee, like Alf Perry earlier, was clearly tired from his two earlier 3-game tussles and the younger Les had an easy ride 11 & 10 to become 3rd division champion. We almost had a major upset in the 4/5 event No.1 seed Alan Davies narrowly surviving in the 1/4s against Clara Howard (who you will hear more of her later in this report) 14, -19, 19. From then Alan had a comfortable ride beating team-mate and captain Rob Peverall 11 & 18 in the final having beaten Martyn Roberts 18 & 16 in the semi. Rob had a very easy ride throughout taking his semi against Johnny Tsang 17 & 14. The divisional event is a great leveller and is deserving of more support so why not

give it serious consideration knowing as you will the ability of those you will meet and you will be in with a good chance and have some good matches. If you enter every event open to you then you will get plenty of games and have an enjoyable day along with a chance to mix more socially with other players.

The Veteran singles that followed attracted an entry of 34 and played as a straight knockout saw the seeded players having a fairly smooth passage, Ted Birch getting involved in a marathon with Dave Harse and emerging tired but victorious 23, -19, 16 from his 1st round battle only to lose to John Rankin 8 & 16. No.2 & 3 seeds Ken Jackson and Peter Lee romped easily to their semi where Peter appeared to run out of steam, holder Ken going through to the final -15, 17, 8. The big surprise came in the other semi when No.1 seed John Rankin met unseeded Dave Roberts who had had a hard passage beating on the way Alan Chase -19, 21 & 14 and then disposing of No.4 seed Peter Taylor 19, -19, 14. This was a great semi and virtually brought the tournament to a halt in its final stages. John taking the first game 15 and Dave the second 17, Dave leading 19/16 in the 3rd with John serving. John narrowed the gap and looked likely to level the score when Dave won a vital point to take him to 20. John was in full flow but suddenly it was all over and with it John's bid to become our veteran champion. We all like to think we can take defeat on the chin but often we don't and I have to pay credit to John who although he must have been bitterly disappointed took it well and was full of praise for Dave in what was the match of the day.

There were to be no surprises in the doubles event but plenty of close shaves, scratch pairing Mike Power/John Langton almost produced one losing -15, 18 & 19 to Ken Jackson/Fred Bainbridge just when it looked like they had it all sewn up. John Dyson/Steve Gittins also gave No.2 seeds Peter Lee/Peter Taylor a fright when having themselves survived a 3-gamer against Rob Peverall/Alan Davies lost narrowly to Lee/Taylor -17, 14 & 20 in what would have been a major upset. No.1 seeds Kevin Dolder/John Rankin also had a scare against Ted Birch/Alan Chase in the semis winning the first 20 and losing the second at same score but running away with the 3rd game 4. In the other semi Lee/Taylor cruised to an easy victory over No.3 seeds Jackson/Bainbridge 10 & 17. The junior event was again a disappointment with only 3 entries and was won comfortably by Paul O'Donnell who defeated Clara Howard and Lee Proffitt both in two straight with Clara taking runner up place with a 2 straight win against Lee. The lack of junior players in our league should be of concern to everyone and we should be concentrating our attention on the need to attract young players to our sport and then hang on to them to ensure we have a future.

We also have a shortage of women players with only six of the few we do have entering the Women's singles but although few in number the event brought about a most surprising victory, one that turned the event on its head and resulted in the No. 1 and 2 seeds meeting each other in a semi and not the final. One of the new ideas for introduction next year is that of a Best Performance Award and had it been introduced this season



Alice Howard receiving the Ladies Singles Trophy from Mrs. Carol Crone

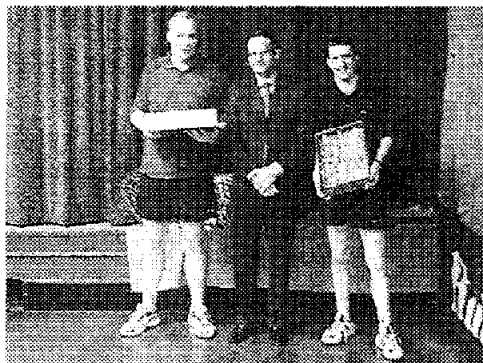
Clara Howard would have been awarded that accolade, young she may be but she plays with the assurance of a seasoned player and followed up her near upset of Alan Davies in the divisional event to record the best win of the day when she defeated elder sister and current Ladies champion Alice in her group to push Alice into 2nd place in the group and almost 3rd as she narrowly survived a 3-gamer against our Fixture Secretary and a former champion, Paula French. Ironically, Clara, having soundly defeated Alice, had already lost to Paula 2 straight and with Paula losing to Alice in 3 Clara was the loser in the count back that followed. Clearly rattled by her defeat at the hands of her younger sister Alice struggled to regain her composure taking the first against Paula game 12 only to see Paula fight back and take the next game 20. It was nip and tuck in the 3rd until Alice gradually took control to run out a very relieved winner 15 in the 3rd and so keep alive her hopes of retaining her title. You can't keep those Howard's down and in the other group mother

Stephanie Howard almost got on the surprise win list losing narrowly to Cherith Graham 16 in the 3rd. In the semis Paula took on Cherith, her greater experience taking her through to the final 16, -19, 17. The other semi saw the clash of the No.1 and 2 seeds courtesy of Clara and Alice going through to the final with a 15, -18, 15, win over Gemma Lloyd.

Surprise wins continued in the final event, the MS, Mikhael Bollac knocking out 4th seed Peter Lee 17 & 17 and then losing to Tom Murray 14 & 19, Tom having had a surprise win against Ahmed Thabet 13 & 13 who in turn had beaten Peter Taylor in 3. In the bottom half Alan Davies recorded two good wins against Ritchie Cragg and Jon Dyson to reach the 1/4s, Omid Khaiyat knocking out No.3 seed Ken Jackson in a 3 game thriller -20, 15 & 17 to give us two new faces on Finals night in the Men's semis. On his way to the semis Omid also beat Mick Allen and had another win over Colin Rourke. Neither Kevin Dolder nor John Rankin raising a sweat as they cruised to the semi final stage.

Due to scratchings and w/o's only five matches were played in the Men's Plate Mike Ashton being the winner with a surprise win over Steve Kcc in a hard fought final 18, -9, 19 that was also the final match of the day. Biggest surprise for me on the day being the response to a request for assistance in clearing away the equipment with more volunteers than ever before and the work being completed in record time. My sincere thanks to all who assisted with this for all too often it is left to the few rather than the many. Setting up was done on Saturday and I must again thank the small party of volunteers who carried out this work during my enforced absence. This was the first time for more years than I care to remember that I have not been present to assist with and oversee the setting up and it is pleasing to be able to report that I had not even been missed an excellent job having been done.

Finals Night came and went, just like that, with no surprises, both MS semis being comfortably won, Kevin against Tom Murray 12 & 14 and John bursting Omid's bubble 6 & 15 but Omid is to be with us for some time and we have not seen the last of this talented and likeable player. In the final Kevin took the first game 20 stepping up a gear in the second to win 21/10 and comfortably retain his title. He and John teamed up in the doubles for another comfortable win 16 & 16 against the two Peters, Lee & Taylor. The VS was also all over in two straight, Ken Jackson comfortably retaining his title 17 & 16 against Dave Roberts. A slight hiccup in the WS when Paula fought back to take the second 19 after losing the first game 17, Alice making certain she was not to be on the receiving end of another surprise defeat by taking the 3rd comfortably game 7. Leo and Carol Crone along with David Fawley son of Bill Fawley made presentations, as did Brian Leeson and Eddie Cameron. Ted Birch did the honours for the divisional presentations and

'A' should be relegated from the 1st. division notwithstanding the fact that the division was one short. Who knows whether they were right or wrong. I know Peter Lee will take a pot at that question and he may have a point. It just seems ironic that the division remained short once the Police 1st team conceded their first three matches. It may be little consolation, but I'm sure that YM. 'A' will be with us next season once they have won promotion from the 2nd.

Before I crack on with my report, I'd like to apologise for missing the Christmas Digest. A 2 year old baby, three shifts and working 6 days a week (me- not the baby) is not compatible for creating spare time for sitting at the computer. I hope you don't mind, but it seems a shame to miss out on the earlier games, so what I intend to do is write about the Pre-Christmas matches and then catch up with everything in the last Digest.

Back to the 1st division and we see the Championship favorites CADWA started the season with 10-nil win, this being against Waterloo, and CADWA would have repeated the score against Fords if it wasn't for a James Eaton win over Pete Taylor. I can't see where the Title challenge will come. Certainly not the Police team who have lost influential players and I think the Wavertree 1st team will agree that they have long been unable to boast the calibre of players needed to win or challenge the likes of CADWA. It is because of this that CADWA have the luxury of not relying on the continuous turn out of Keith Williams and Kevin Dolder. This in turn leads to reserves playing and some points dropped. Thus limiting 10-nil wins.

Perhaps the real battle is between who will finish in 2nd Spot. Wavertree 1st are there at the moment but the likes of Police, Y.M. and Harold House are snapping at their heels. You could also forgive Wavertree for thinking that their first game Harold House would be points in the bag, particularly when the Harold House team consisted of Eddie Clein. However Harold House hadn't read the script, or 'prescription' in Eddie's case, and duly ended the night as 7-3 winners. Eddie won all his three which consisted of a great win over Dave Roberts. Dave also lost out to Alec Bryce. Wavertree made amends by beating CADWA 'A' 6-4 but yet again Dave dropped a point against Pete Taylor. Roy Smith had mixed fortunes against Bath St. 'A' to earn a draw but lost the only two sets of the Waterloo match to Alan Chase and Ted Birch.

The collective decision of John Rankin and Paul Hutchins (I'm sure they share a bunk bed - I

wonder who 'sleeps' on top) to reduce their availability to play regularly split the end of the first team in its previous form and it was inevitable that we could not sustain two 1st division teams. The choice to disband the 'A' team was necessary but very regrettable. So you're left with Steve and I and 'A another'. Police got off to a good 9-1 win over CADWA 'A'. Colin Rourke beating Ste. For CADWA's consolation point. We then went on to lose 6-4 against Bath St.'A' with Ian McElwee 'doing me' once again. Steve made amends by getting a hat trick against Marconi which also saw Gemma Lloyd having a great win over Bob Edwards.

Eddie Clein's stint in the lower divisions has had little effect upon his ability to step back into the first division and grab a few scalps. Actually, up to a few weeks ago he hasn't lost any. 'Fords' Tim Weardon, who had previously beaten Ray Jackson and Ken Connor couldn't get the better of Eddie, resulting in a 6-4 H. H. win. Bath St. 'A' went down 8-2, and again Eddie did not drop a set. Harold House bettered this with great 9-1 win over CADWA 'A', this not only saw Eddie losing his 100% to Billy Hargreaves, but saw the rarity of Ken Hartley losing all his three.

Liverpool YMCA's Peter Lee has taken up the No. 1 spot in the absence of my field correspondent Pat McLoughlin (Pat actually wrote comments of the match card unlike others who use it to test whether their pen is working). Y.M. started the season well with a 8-2 win over Bath St. 'A', Ian Grant having a good win over the talented Paul O'Donnell, beating him 28-26 in the third. Ahmed Thabet kept his 1st division eye in when a guest appearance saw him win all his three against Fords.

The reshuffling of the Bath St. teams, whether intentionally or not, has lead to both the 1st and 'A' team having an overall balance of strength throughout. The 1st team began with a 9-1 win against Marconi with Brenda Bouey losing out to Trevor Owen. They didn't have it all their own way against Waterloo with Alan Chase and Riki Brown beating Fred Bainbridge and Alan continuing his good form against Brenda. Kenny Jackson and Fred had mixed fortunes against Fords, Kenny won his three whilst Fred did not, final result 6-4 in Bath St's. favour.

The fact that only 5 points separate the Bath St. teams is good evidence of their consolidation working. Ian Grant and Mike Kean got the only points when they both had a great win over Y.M.'s Deli Olyumbo. Ian has adapted well into the 1st division, I played him recently and I considered myself lucky to beat him.

Marconi's first game back in the 1st against Bath St. had a harsh touch of reality when they went down 9-1 with Trevor Owen saving the whitewash by beating Brenda. Marconi fared better against Y.M. getting beat 3-7 and saw Bob Edwards beat Paul O'Donnell and Ahmed Thabet, whilst Trevor had a tremendous win over Deli. Police came out 7-3 against Marconi. Gemma Lloyd having a good win over Bob, but losing out to Tim Tennett.

CADWA 'A' have adopted the Alex Ferguson approach by fielding different teams for their first 5 matches. This is subsequently reflected in their results, 9-1 defeat against Police, 4-6 defeat against Wav. 1st team, but a solid performance against potential relegation opponents Marconi, gaining a draw. Mike Power on this occasion had a great win over Bob Edwards.

CADWA's Mike Mahoney told us a great story about the hard of hearing Peter Taylor. Apparently Peter told Mike and the other lads that their days of taking the mickey out of him were numbered as he had recently purchased, and was in fact wearing, the most electronically advanced hearing aid on the market. Mike then asked Peter how much the hearing aid had cost, to which Peter replied, "Wednesday".

Now where was I?, oh yes, A warm welcome back to the division for the Waterloo chaps. Not such a warm welcome by the 10-0 beating by CADWA, but I know that the likes of Alan, Ted and Riki will take it in their stride and they'll know that it's the pinching of other games which is the key to survival. Alan has started the season in good form. Wins over Fred Bainbridge, Brenda Bouey, and a great win by both Alan and Ted over Y.M.'s Deli Olyumbo has put vital points in the bag. A 4-6 defeat by Police nevertheless saw Alan beat Ste Gittins. Both Alan and Ted did the double over Wav's. Roy Smith.

Breathing down Waterloo's neck are the Fords lads who are just as keen to maintain their 1st division status as anyone. Tim Weardon must have produced a steady performance to beat Ray Jackson and Ken Connor from Harold House. Tom Murray also beat Ken and helped to gain 4 important points. James Eaton, a very natural player but perhaps not as consistent as he would like, is also playing his part. Good wins over Peter Taylor and Paul O'Donnell notched up vital points.

Well that's the lot for now. I hope you all had a good Christmas and I hope you remembered that old Korean proverb..... "A dogs not just for Christmas..... save some for Boxing Day as well."

I was also going to leave you fellas some sound advice when shopping for presents for the missus. If you're buying her clothes take my advice. Buy clothes marked 'Petite', but keep the receipt. You can't go wrong.

2nd DIVISION NOTES SYLVIA GRAHAM

Well it's now mid-Feb and the season looks to be well and truly sewn up.... that's if three teams are being promoted. If three teams are not being promoted then it could become very interesting. I don't



mean that it's not worth fielding your best side every match because it iseven if it's only to cause an upset ...and get mentioned in the digest but ultimately I think that Manweb, YMCA 'A' and Maghull will go up and Wavertree Labour 'A' and Bootle JC will go down. To give them their due Labour have tried to strengthen their side with Roy Adams and Mark Miles (whom I believe cannot come to grips with the 11-up system on the Wirral) but I think it's just a little too late. Bootle JC has not been able to field the settled side of last season and has, through no fault of their own, paid the penalty.

Liverpool YMCA have again introduced new players to the division adding to their cosmopolitan flavour and are now fielding the second division champion, Omid Alizadeh (Iran) and Torstein Bondel (Norway).....where do they get them from? Sadly the season has been put into perspective by the untimely passing of Billy Proffitt which was a tremendous shock to us all. The last time I saw Billy was at the Closed Championships, where typically, Billy had shown up the day before to help erect the tables etc. and sure enough he was there at the close helping with their removal. I understand that Billy was closely involved in football and golf as well as table-tennis, and gave these sports just as much enthusiasm and commitment. The attendance at Billy's funeral was testament to the regard in which he was held by so many. **He will be missed by us all and I speak for our division in conveying our sympathies to his family and team-mates at Fords.**

Referring back to the championships, there was an average turn-out by division three players and they certainly produced a competitive and quality divisional tournament. The predictions of my earlier notes were given some credence, when Les Molyneux came out as winner after a particularly hard battle against Matt Poerschke in the semi-final, and a final win over wily and tireless old stager, Les Gee. Congratulations to all.

At the time of writing, there is approximately one third of the season left to play and the indications are that it is going down to the wire with every likelihood of a play-off which could involve three teams which are currently separated by four points only.

The division has actually settled down, and now consists, more or less, of three separate leagues. The aforesaid top three are still led by Fords by a single point and they will obviously feel the loss of Billy in the run-in. However if they can turn out their strongest four of Grahame Reid, Frank James, Robbie Goldson and evergreen Alf Perry, they can still go all the way.

They are being pushed, as predicted in the last notes, by Manweb 'B' who have rightly re-ranked Les up to No. 1 and he is still ably assisted by Rob and Mike Barker, and probably the best number four in the division in Neil Jennings. (can you get me one of those hips Neil?).

The battle of the number fours saw Neil beat the 'Big L' in a significant match with Police who have turned out to be the final team in the triumvirate challenging for the top. Police have a game in hand over the top two and are just a few points behind, and that 7-3 win over Manweb could have a huge bearing. Man of the match was Tony Harris with three successful visits to the table. If Police can maintain the same turn-out for the remaining games, the title could be theirs. I certainly could not speculate which of these three will triumph.

There is a chasing pack of five teams on the heels of the top three, however it is unlikely that enough ground could be made up. Leading this pack we have Marconi and Manweb 'A' who I think have both under performed, particularly when you see a 6-4 Manweb win over Fords with a treble from Paul Evans.

Incidentally, I wonder what the situation would have been if slightly different combinations had emerged from the Manweb squads at the beginning of the season?, who knows?.

Peter Wass has continued in good form for Marconi and he too has been promoted to number one for the run-in, however as I have said, it is probably a little too late.

Bootle YMCA have proved to be as consistent as ever, mainly, I think, due to their ability to turn out the same four week after week. Perhaps if one or two of the teams above them had been able to show the same consistency, we could well have had a different outcome. Matt Poeschke has turned out to be a tremendous acquisition for the Y.M. and has not lost too many, including a good double over the Jennings brothers at Manweb 'A'.

Waterloo also have a habit of turning out the same four, although I think Ro. Craddock has missed a couple of late. **I hope you are O.K. Ro.** At the time of writing, Waterloo have a couple of games in hand and the right results may push them fourth. As ever their strength lies up at the top of the order, and to date have not seen a card showing a defeat for number one Graeme Black. No doubt someone will put me right.

Clinging on to the coat tails of this second group, are Bath Street with some shuffling in the

team to include Neil Pritchett at number one who probably had his best night at Bootle YMCA with wins over John H. and Matt. Bath Street also had a good night against Waterloo, winning 6-4 after being 4-1 down. Hopefully we are now in the safety zone.

The foot of the table is as interesting and competitive as the top with nothing conclusive at present, other than the bottom four consists of the two Wavertree Labour teams and both of the Maghull teams. Labour 'C' look to be almost safe, but will be disappointed because the first half of the season saw them placed quite respectably. A run of poor results since Christmas produced a downward slide, but they too, are a side that puts out the same four consistently, and I think they will survive.

Labour 'B' have also produced a better second half and have crept above Maghull 'A' and whilst they only have one win to their credit, they have picked up some useful points, mainly at the expense of the Maghull teams, but I do not think they are safe yet.

Perhaps it is no coincidence to find the Wavertree and Maghull teams in these precarious positions because I think that both clubs have lost some of their stronger players recently, and I sympathise with those players who are currently trying to keep their clubs afloat.

Maghull 'A' have been sucked down to next to bottom, however with a game in hand and vast experience in their midst, they will battle it out until the very end. Eddie Preston, Tommy Downing, George Frost and Harry McGanity; show me a team that will battle more than that line-up.

Unfortunately I do not think there is any escape for Maghull 'B'. Sadly they have been unable to produce a win all season, yet perusing the cards, I find that Phil Christie, Steve McGanity, Brian Gregory and Wilf Gibson have all produced good individual performances at different times. I suspect that if they go down, they will return soon.

Talking of individual performances, to date the face-savers include John Higham at Fords, Colin Fyles against Waterloo, Eddie Preston against Police, Kevin Lewis for Maghull 'A' against Marconi, George Frost against Bootle Y.M., and a particularly good result for Peter Howden (Labour 'B') playing at number one, at Fords.

There are not too many games left to the end of the season, however there is still a lot to play for and there may be some surprises in store. I hope that the division continues to produce a high standard of play in the friendliest of atmospheres.

CADWA 'C' have continued their push for promotion with a pace that has not seen the gap 'twixt them and the chasing pack diminish, this despite a few problems with player availability. They visited **Maghull 'C'** with a reserve and then had to concede walkovers with a no show. Alan Davies was the only man to lose, against Bill Salter. Losing the first to 19, he then looked down and out in the second but had a tremendous run of points to level. But the effort seemed to have taken a lot out of him, as he failed to dominate in the final game. Bob Peverall performed better, beating Bill in 3 and catching up with Alan in the percentages stakes in the process. Home to **Wav Lab 'D'**, two reserves came off the 'D' team subs bench which allowed Ken & Stan to get a singles win, and they then doubled up to maintain their 100% record whilst taking Alan & Robs unbeaten record. Again with two (different) reserves from the 'D' team at **Linacre**, it wasn't the reserves who lost in the 8-2 victory, as Alan & Rob felt the harsh wrath of Harry Reeve as he failed to buckle from deuce in both matches.

When 'C' met 'D', it was 'D' who were one short, so the 7-3 result could be better interpreted as a 4-3. Alan had very similar games, getting his monies worth after losing the first game to both Steve Critchley & Trevor Dolder 20/22, but gaining composure in the final games. Whereas Bob Peverall lost to Steve, as did Peter Roberts to Trevor Dolder (who was in a strong purple patch) and Doug beating Ian Burrows. Peter & Ian have picked up their games since then, although Peter would not like to be reminded how Stephanie Howard beat him to save a white wash for Wav Lab 'E', so I won't. And it was precisely 10-0s meted out to **Aighurth** and **Manweb 'C'**. Carl Anderson couldn't thwart Alan (20/22 in 3rd), Eric Wood had Peter on the ropes in the 2nd at deuce, eventually 23/25, and Pete Carney was piped to the post by Ian in 3, 23/25. **Bath St 'E'** fared slightly better, the notes on the card best describe the match: "Despite the 8-2 result CADWA 'C' appeared under pressure as 4 games were 3 setters with Bath St players Edwards and Willis resoundly winning in the third against Roberts & Critchley respectively. CADWA 'C' retain 100% record this season as the push for promotion enters it's third phase".

There was a telling meeting of relegation dodgers in November when **Wavertree Labour 'E'** played hosts to **Linacre**. Anthony Mitchell playing at number 1 in the absence of Dave Foulis got the evening off to a good start for the home side beating Jack Davidson in 2. Steve Perry, never one to resist a challenge, then sportingly called himself on

against the oppo's number one Harry Reeve. Steve gave as good as he got and narrowly lost the second game 24/26. Clara Howard then overturned the formbook as 4 beat 3 (in the guise of Ken Ainsworth) in the only 3 gamer of the night. Eric Spencer then beat Frank Lacey to give **WL'E'** a two point cushion that they maintained to the end of the night, winning out 6-4. Not a big margin of victory, but an important psychological advantage to the Perrites.

Another club with strength in depth, **Bath Street**, will be no doubt proud of the way the 'E' team have been acquitting themselves. Dashing aside challenges of **Bootle YM** and **Wav Lab 'D' & 'E'** to the tune of 7-3. **BS'E'** seem to be dancing to a 4/5 beat, alternating the number 4 spot between Dave Batty and Norman Lindsay. Reg is the main Orchestrator, Dave Stoddern the soloist, and Dave Cunningham the capable accompanist. Two of the best players in the division came head to head when **BS'E'** took on **Linacre** in the bleak mid-season of December. Dave Stoddern came back from a crushing first game defeat to overcome Harry 24/22 in the decider. Things started well for **Linacre** with Harry beating Reg, and at the tea break they were only 2-3 down. But a team pushing for promotion takes no prisoners and **BS'E'** won the second half 5-0, recording 8-2 on the card. **Aighurth's** top four took advantage of a weakened **BS'E'** who played a club ranked 35 at number 4, to win 6-4. Surprisingly Carl Anderson beat Reg Edwards in a hotly contested encounter (21/19 in't 3rd) but then succumbed to Norman. Reg had a similar taut battle with Graham "Rollo" Rollinson, but this time got the right side of the 19/21 third game. Alan Willis was brought in for the game against **CADWA 'C'**, and he beat opposing sub Steve Critchley to secure a point, as Reg beat Peter Roberts for the only highlights in the 2-8 defeat. Honours were more even when **BS'E'** visited **CADWA** to play the 'D' team. Dave & Reg were on top form to bag their singles brace, but **CADWA 'D'** came back to level the match as a draw.

Wav Labs teams have had conflicting fortunes and only a 3-7 defeat from **Bath Street** in common. Team 'D' have had a steady stream of victories, so the defeat by **BS'E'** was even more of a surprise. Dave & Reg were strong and all 4 of the 3 gamers went to the visitors. Ken in both his matches could have won but lost from deuce. Stan learnt the hard way how much **BS'E'** don't want to go up losing 20/22 to Reg in the 3rd. **Aighurth** put up a solid resistance to secure a draw, Carl Anderson being the man of the match for the home team beating Ken & Rez, and Stan m.o.t.m. for Wav Lab 'D' beating Graham and Ray Jones. These dips have been overcome with strong wins:- 8-2 over **Maghull 'C'** (praise Denise Chorley for beating Ken and Bill for beating Paul Banks), 7-3 over **Linacre**, 6-4 at the **Liv YM** (Ken overcoming Mr Clewett and Russell) and best of all to date 9-1 v **Bootle YM** (Berty preventing the whitewash, as Rez & sub Dave Goulden pulled

out all the stops to both beat Peter Williams over 3).

Wav Lab 'E' have different concerns. They've set themselves up with a chance of avoiding being thrown into the crack of doom by limiting the defeats and beating rivals. They put the **Maghull Nagul** to the sword 7-3, the main feat of wizardry being Dave Foulis (21/18 & 27/25) v Bill Salter. Dave in turn found **Aigburth** a tougher prospect losing to Rollo and then Carl (losing from deuce in the 3rd), which he tells me is a trait he has developed of late), at least Anthony Mitchell held his own as **Aigburth** won 6-4 with Cap'n Woodsy leading by example. Different venue, same team, same score at **Manweb**, as their top two; Conley & Ashley were undefeated. A draw v **CADWA 'D'** was very welcome as Dave returned to form winning against the St Helens lads in two straight. And as for the **BS'E'** game mentioned above at least Steve Perry will look back on his defeat of Reg Edwards with fondness, as will Anthony on his game v Dave Cunningham. This must have been a long nights labour as seven games went to a third, all of which were decided within a four point margin.

Chain Mail : To sum up the remaining cards, here's a nice little chain ...

Bootle YM 'A' took full advantage of back to back home games, firstly beating **Linacre** 8-2, where Berty played his game of the season in beating Harry for the first time in a league match, coming from a game down, narrowly pinching the second set 29/27 and storming the decider. Another season's first was both Jim & Peter winning both their singles. The following week similar score of 7-3 dished out to **Aigburth**, again Bert winning both, and Mike & Peter doing same with each of their 4 sets going to a third game. These results restored a good home record for BYM which had been dented by the visit of YM rivals **Liverpool YMCA 'C'**, 4-6, Russell & Johnny Tsang turning the tide for the visitors.

Playing at home **LYM 'C'** had a similar downfall, losing to **CADWA 'D'** 4-6, again thanks to two good performances, this time from Critchley and Dolder who were both pleased to beat the redoubtable Mr Clewett. I have to admit that Jonny had a good comeback in the third game against mesell, to win out 22/20. YM shared a draw at Linacre, Linacre's 3rd of the season and a good result for them. However they'd have preferred to have Harry available for the crucial match with Aigburth, especially as they too were without their number 1 - Graham Rollinson. You'd hardly call it a weakened team as Aigburth won through 8-2, with only Jack Davidson flying the flag of victory for on the Linacre pole. Aigburth, with Rollo, didn't travel as well to **CADWA 'D'**, losing 4-6 with Lee Proffitt standing in at short notice. Steve & John O'Sullivan were the key men for **CADWA** on this occasion. On the trip North to **Maghull John & Trevor** suffered at the hands of Bill Salter, but

John enjoyed playing old coachce Denise Chorley, who in turn enjoyed playing Jack Highton, as the evening again ended 6-4 to **CADWA 'D'**.

Maghull 'C's first game of the new year was a bitter experience with only the tactic of playing 1&2 as second doubles earning them a point at **Bath St 'E'**. Denise & John Gillibrand are making a good stab at first doubles, usually going down 1-2. **Bath St 'E'** then played hosts the following week as they beat **Manweb 'C'** 7-3. Not bad, 16 points out of 20, promotion form indeed. Pete Carney was involved in all 3 **Manweb** points, first narrowly beating Reg in game one, and comfortably in game 2. A fortnight later and the same **Manweb 4** were at home to **Liverpool YM 'C'**, enjoying a well earned 8-2 victory. John Ashley got the best of starts in the wars with Jimmy Clewett and Alvin Tso, whilst Arthur had close encounters with Jimmy (lost) and Russell (won). Johnny Tsang found P.Carney too strong, but was in turn too strong for A Radcliffe. In YMs 7-3 win over **Aigburth**, Jimmy lost to Rollo, but Alvin and Francis Lay held firm. Much the same performance a week later with **Maghull 'C'** visiting and Johnny replacing Francis at 4, result 8-2. Without Bill, Naresh Tagore led the team and came as close as anyone to beating Jimmy, 21/17, 20/22, 20/22, but not quite. However Denise did surprise young JC winning in two straight and almost made it a double losing narrowly to Russell who regained his cool after losing the second game from deuce. Naresh & Denise teamed up to steal the other point out of the pockets of Jimmy & Russell. The score was the same at their next game, home against the other YM team of the Bootle variety. Bill did for Bert and Naresh did for Jim Geddes for the 2 points. But that was their only highlights as Mike Hughes & Peter Williams proved unstoppable. With Arthur Garnett barking orders from the sidelines, Bootle YM turned in another impressive performance 8-2 over **Manweb 'C'**. Mike will definitely be off John Ashley's crimbo card list due to his 25/23, 22/22 parrot sickner. It was against **Manweb 'C'** that **CADWA 'D'** had one of their better nights winning 7-3, in the return to the fixture mentioned above. Rob Conley was available that night but Pete Carney wasn't. **CADWA 'D'** had Don Davies making a welcome return. Alan Biggs was back and showed signs of his old self beating Don & yours truly (20/22 in the 3rd). Not a good night for me as John Ashley's determination also won through. What a comforting note for me to end my resume of the cards on:- me losing both my singles. What do you mean again!

A quick word on the Forrest Cup where **CADWA 'C'**, to no ones surprise are in the final after beating a valiant **Aigburth** in the first semi. Club mates **CADWA 'D'** were unable to make it an all **CADWA** final, losing at **Wav Lab 'D'** who although without number 1 Paul Banks, were able to bolster the side with Dave Foulis at 4.

So, rather like a 1500 metres race CADWA 'C' are 200 metres ahead going into the last lap. But the chasing pack seems to be slowing down, encouraging each other to take the lead. This is most likely due to the prospect of 3 teams going up this year. There's a strong whiff of BS (and I'm not talking backspin here) coming from team captains. When Ken & even Reg try to make you believe that they don't want to go up, you have to ask them 'well, why are you still winning?' It's a strange situation when I get chastised by the fellow promotion contenders for my team not winning enough games!
