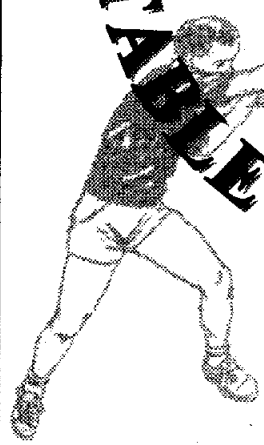

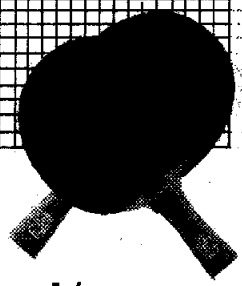
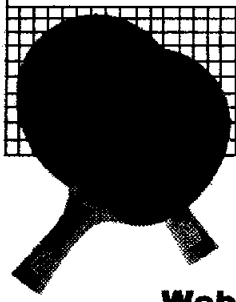

# EDITORIAL



First of all I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Mr Bill Fawley as our new President of the L&DTTL, Bill was approached during the summer if he would be prepared to undertake the Presidents role, and I'm told, accepted immediately. Bill played table tennis many years ago, and must have been pretty good, as he managed a few games representing the City, and of course, is the main sponsor for our own closed tournament. I don't think Bill is prepared just to be a figurehead, as he has attended both Man. Com. Meetings recently, while still finding his feet (League wise) his input is most helpful.

The new season is now well under way, and has already brought a few administrative problems, as the Digest Editor, the Cup Secretary and member of the Management Committee, I'm having to read the League Rules more than ever due to more instances of, to put it mildly, lack of knowledge of the rules, and also "trying to get around them". This season all clubs were given the latest printout of the League Rules, in a handy size Filofax type Diary, one for every team captain as well as the Club Secretary. It would take about 15 minutes to read through the rules, just to get a rough idea what they are about, and if followed, to save any disagreements later, rules are for every ones benefit.

At the first Man. Com. Meeting of the season, 2 controversial subjects came up, one a case of wrongdoing, the other a case of possible unfair advantage.

The first was from the first round of the Divisional Cup, a 1<sup>st</sup>. div. home team decided they couldn't play the match and contacted the away team to give the walkover, but then the home team decided to send in a match card (unknown to the away team) to say that the away team had won by 5-1, this obviously to save a fine. This misdemeanour was picked up by the fixture secretary on two counts, only the home captain had signed the card, (match regulation 15 requires both captains to sign the card), but also an ineligible player had been entered into the away teams list, so the innocent away team could easily have been disqualified from the cup, so we have two rules involved here, match regulation 7 "no club shall play an ineligible player; or send in as having taken part in a match, the name of a player who did not do so" and Penalties and protests Rule 19a, "any team playing an ineligible player in a cup match shall forfeit the match". But the fixture Sec. decided to check this out, and his call to the captain of the away team started what

turned out to be about 18 telephone calls involving the home team sec., the away team sec. the two team captains, the Cup sec. the League sec. the fixture sec. a ridiculous amount of chasing around to get the facts, all to save a basic fine, we know everyone prefers to play the matches, but lets be above board, what started as a take a chance card has caused a lot of extra work for a lot of people, and a hefty fine for the offending club.

The other subject is a possible case of unfair advantage, again in the cup, but this time the Frank Murphy Trophy, at present Clubs can enter any number of teams with enough players to cover, the draw is made, the matches played, once a player has played, he is "cup tied" and cannot play for another team, Vet. Cup Regulation Rule 6. "no player may play for more than one team". But where a club has teams playing each other and one team gives the other team a walk over, for whatever reason, and no players are entered on the card, (at present, no requirement to do so), all those players go through to the next round, is this an unintentional advantage! Do we need a Rule change to require clubs entering teams, to list players to a team, when that team goes out so do 3 of those players listed on a match card, your thoughts on this to your secretary for discussion.

It is said in various quarters that our fixture secretary "enjoys giving out fines", I know that isn't true, but he does have to abide by the Rules (as existing) of the League. We can't expect him to be Judge and Jury over why rules are contravened. If a team plays short, an automatic fine, he would sooner they played a full team, for the sake of the opponents, we can't expect him to pass judgement on the reasons given for playing short, as this would open him to possible accusations of favouritism. Late cards lead to another fine which could be avoided if cards were posted straight away. Lost cards, but who's lost them. Playing ineligible players, with the hefty penalty points that go with this one, we know no club does this knowingly, but if a player's registration is not with the League Secretary before he plays, he is an ineligible player, no "ifs" or "buts". When a club registers a player after the season starts, it would always be safe to check that the registration had been received and accepted before he plays. It has already happened this season, with a club being penalised twice, for playing an unregistered player in two games before it was picked up, the reason being that the second match card arrived before the first, but the rules are there for the safeguard of all teams, if as it seems, people don't agree with the level of fines, let's change the rules, it's as easy as that!

The three clubs who finished last season with the threat of 'find new premises or disband', have all managed to save the day, and all are now established in new homes. Waterloo have moved to the same Methodist

Church as Linacre, in Waterloo, the club did break up a bit (player wise) with only the 1<sup>st</sup>. team playing from here, most of the other players moving to other clubs. Liverpool YMCA are playing in commercial premises off Long Lanc, Aintree, thanks to one of their members, Lawrence K., but the players have worked overtime to clean the rooms up, decorate them, and fit new lighting, they will miss the wide open space of the old YMCA, but the space is on a par with some other clubs, and they have the added bonus of use of the premises 24 hours a day 7 days a week, you can't ask for more than that, the YM also have a new secretary in the shape of Steve Kee, who with Mikael Bellec, will keep the club in front. Ex secretary George Smith has moved on to Cadwa to help with their shortage of players. Last Club, Marconi, are now playing from Childwall Methodist Church, a big hall, with two matches in the same room, so lots of respect and patience needed from players for the other match going on. So thanks to those club Secs. who have put in the extra work through the summer months.

The 5<sup>th</sup> division started the season in a little bit of confusion, even though fixture Sec. Trevor Owens had spent loads of time to devise a fixture list based on the expected 8 teams, so that they would get regular games. (not like last season), as soon as the season started, there were clubs cancelling games, and then Police 'C' dropping out of the League, to once again bring the prospect of free weeks for the other clubs. I wouldn't mind but a club were looking at the prospect of putting another team into the 5<sup>th</sup>, but it would have been impossible to organise a fixture list with the additional team. (9 teams) at short notice.

August Bank Holiday was again the date of the Liverpool Grand Prix at the Liverpool Tennis Centre, with over 250 entries, Scotland's Euan Walker won the Men's singles title, beating Michael Rogala of Poland in the Final, . Clare Newns won the women's band 1 singles, and Brenda Buocoy won the Vets. Women, both players from Bath St. TT Club. Thanks again to the small band of helpers who set up and dismantled all the the equipment that makes this event possible.

The next big tournament in Liverpool is the City of Liverpool Junior 4 Star tournament, Sat./Sun. 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> January 2004 at the Greenbank Academy, so to see the stars of tomorrow, and some who are already class acts, make a point of going, it's free to watch.

Once again, the old adage "many hands make light work" anyone able to help with the setting up etc. please contact Arthur Garnett, Ken Armson, myself, or any of the Man. Com.

You will be pleased to know our Divisional writers are again at full strength, Paul has agreed to carry on with Div.1, as we couldn't get a volunteer to cover, Sylvia is still in Div.2. for the 10<sup>th</sup> year it seems. Tony Harris's team was promoted to the second div. so Steve Kee from Liverpool YMCA has accepted the challenge for Div. 3. Div. 4 welcomes Stan Clarke who

has taken over from Steve Perry, and Doug Baker takes Div 5 off me, thank goodness, Doug assures me, the ink hasn't dried up in his pen, remember those epics! So many thanks to those who have gone, and thanks to those who now have the cards

My team mates at Bootle YM, have asked me why has my photo in the Editorial got bigger each Digest, they can be forgiven for the misconceptions they have formed, (big head), not having the vast media experience that I have, ( 3 years and still learning!), when I tell them that it's to fill up the 'white space', they look at me with that blank disbelieving look, I reckon they owe me a few pints.

We welcome three new names who have recently appeared on match cards in the third division, Michael Rogala. (Poland), Yann Sladek. (France), and Robin Ashleigh, I first heard of Michael Rogala playing in the recent Liverpool Butterfly Grand Prix, where he finished up narrowly losing to Scotland's Euan Walker, in the Final in 5 games. On the way to the Final, Michael accounted for Craig Bryant in 5, and Fabio Mantogazza from Milan, in 4. So, what must be termed a "coup" for the Greenbank Club, Michael may appear at the other end of the table in division 3. Yann Sladek, now playing for Cadwa 'B', will stiffen up what was already a strong team. Yann has been a regular league player in the Paris area, but is now studying at the J.M. University in Liverpool. He was so nearly a Bootle YMCA player, appearing at our club one evening during a league match; he said he lived in Aigburth, but it only took him 20 minutes to get to Bootle, and that he was keen to sign, we thought he must mean "20 minutes from the JMU", so after a chat in the bar after the match, he left to catch the bus just around the corner, which he knew the time of from the timetable, (remember the days long ago, of getting to matches on the bus!), and we were left with the rosy prospect of some new young blood. Unfortunately, a couple of days later I had an e-mail from Yann saying he had decided to decline our offer as it had taken him 3 hours to walk home that night, the bus didn't turn up. surprise! We should have told him not to rely on the bus time table, as sometimes the drivers don't follow it either, but we could assure him he wouldn't have to walk home again!, but at least he has signed for another League team (CADWA). Another student from the JMU, is Robin Ashleigh, now playing for Liverpool YMCA 'C', another class player I'm told, coincidentally Robin and Yann met in match 7, Yann winning in 5. So another stiff season for Div. 3. There are a few more new names in other divisions, so welcome to them also.

# 10 Years Ago

I've been asked about doing an "all our yesterdays" type page, and while thinking "what a good idea", I have also thought of the input needed to do it, and also the space required, as we always seem to be able to fill the space available, (24 pages). But now that this Digest is under way, and while I'm waiting for the return of the Div. writers reports, I decided to give it a go, using a Digest exactly 10 years old which I happened to have on loan from John Higham. Vol 49 No.1. there are lots of interesting snippets, which most players still playing will be able to relate to, too many really, but hopefully I can get a fair cross section of comments, (*my comments as I go along, will be in bold italics*)

Jack Lambert was Editor then, aided by Ken Armon (before his title), this Digest was memorable for the changes that took place exactly 10 years ago. Jacks Editorial spoke of the worry that the Digest was "taking too much money out of the Leagues coffers", that was for 4 x A4 pages, you now get 6, in those days, the Digest was put together by a volunteer typist (usually Jack's wife) then passed to the printer for printing. The advent of Home Computers has made what must have been a difficult (*keep the cost down*) job for the volunteers of the day into something more visually rewarding.

Anyway, 10 years ago, fixture secretary for a "loralora" years, Eddie Cameron stepped down to be replaced by heroine of the day Paula French; and League organising secretary for 39 years, John McKim, gives notice of stepping down after this coming season.

Last season, English Electric finally closed the doors on their Sports and Social Club, and with it the table tennis, which in its heyday, had supported 6 teams under Jack Lambert, the first team had just ran away with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Div. title and resurfaced in the 94/95 season as Waterloo, in the first Div., the trauma of the upheaval must have been too much, as they lost all of the first 10 matches. Ken Armon was also Div. 1 writer and was questioning the "sudden changes in direction by our League planners" regards promotion and relegation, (*have times changed*).

The first season for Manweb after M.M.'S enforced absence, throwing their first team into turmoil culminating in disqualification from the Readman cup for playing an ineligible player.

Ken Jackson was having a great season beating among others, Keith Williams, Chris Ford, Peter Taylor, Bernie Wentworth, but going down to Julian Quirk of Bootle J.C. (*Julian is now making a comeback with B.J.C. and doing pretty good*).

Ken finishes his report with "Next issue I will deal with the relegation issue in greater detail", *look out someone!*

Div. 2 had a new writer, Sylvia Graham, (*I wonder if Sylvia realises it's 10 years doing Div. 2, she was also doing others before that, she's still doing a good job!*). "Congratulations to David Cohen", writes Sylvia "for completely re-writing Jewish's fixtures and issuing a really thick white paper", (*has David been doing it for that long, some things never change!*). As now, Sylvia's format ends with her 'good wins, close matches & face savers', *here's a few*, Brenda Buoey and Paula French both beat Eddie Clein in the same match, (*I wonder if Eddie remembered there were ladies present*), and a face saver, George Higham beat Steve Woods, 22 / -25 /23.

Editor Jack, had to do Div. 3, still awaiting a volunteer, I even get a mention off Jack, for writing comments on the match card, (*didn't think I'd been captain that long, shows what the rest of the team are getting away with*), and I must mention this bit, Jack writes "A 10-0 win for Bootle YM over Bath St. 'B', but a couple of corking games. Karen Gibson losing 18m the 3<sup>rd</sup> to Tom Kilip, and Billy Clayton 22-20 to Roly Wright in the 3<sup>rd</sup>, with a couple of walkovers, as Billy wasn't too well, (*sorry Bill, must have been having to put rubber on your bat, couldn't imagine winning against your varnished one!*)

Div. 4 turns out to have Tony Connor writing what was a lengthy set of notes, (*must remember that Tony*), Steve Graham leading a strong Cadwa 'C' team on top of the division, Eric Young has been spotted trying his hand with Curl, Tony mentions a classic match of attack v defence, Kathy Haydon's attacking style just getting the better of Mike Ashton's retrieving, Mike Hughes, (like Tony Sales) combines long pimples backhand with forceful attacking forehand spin, (*bet Mike liked that one, he's still got the bat*). Linacre had to contend with a good start to the season, then losing Harry Reeves to the sea, (*but whether it was he had a TT table on the ship, or the roll of the sea, he was still hard to beat on his return for the second half*).

What's this, Arthur Garnett doing Div. 5, Arthur has quickly spotted that Div.5 is made up with good players, average players, and new players learning the ropes. (*not many of the latter these days*), Arthur says "Ken Armon is undefeated with his new bat, mention it to him and he'll say it's legal" (*Ken's still saying that now, but everyone's used to it, and he's still hard to beat, ask Eddie C.*). Special thought for Barry Meyer

(Aigburth), who played in a match two and a half hours after being discharged from hospital after surgery. Such dedication to the game – must tell the wife! A penalty point was awarded against a player for continuously stamping his feet when serving, (ungentlemanly conduct), I trust that this was done in a friendly manner and followed a warning. Arthur's final point was a remark made to him about an umpire in a match, shouting support to his team mate in between points, (*my thoughts are that while each game is in progress, the umpire should just umpire the game, and be as impartial as possible, If you are the vociferous coach of the team, don't umpire*).

Last page of the Digest had an explanation from Paula on how to fill in the match card fully, *we still have some problems with card filling!*

So that was 10 years ago, that seasons Digests were to be the last of Jack Lambert's Editorship, after 27 years, of keeping the Digest going against the odds, deservedly stepping down for a rest, and the new Editor

was to be Ken Armson, the natural progression, with his "threat" to adopt High-Tech methods (the PC no doubt) to reduce costs, The new Digests were immediately different, probably browbeating others to contribute general articles, and himself starting his award winning "Nets and Edges", *where, if I keep this page going, is where I'll find most of my 'ammunition'*.

The league tables at the back of this Digest had 4 divisions of 12 and the fifth with 11 teams, 12 matches gone.

Kevin Dolder, Keith Williams and John Rankin, gave Liverpool a great boost in their quest to claim the Lancashire and Cheshire League premier division title for the ninth time in ten years, when they won all four matches in the opening group stage of the 2004/05 competition at the Autoquest Stadium in Widnes.

They kicked off with a 5-1 victory over Blackpool. (Kevin, adopting an away from the table defensive style, losing to Steve Bovan), before overcoming Manchester, also for the loss of just one set. Rankin going down to Brian Clements. Bury were their next victims, the East Lancashire side's top player Paul Cicchelli, (a native of Norwich) being their star man, beating Williams in the second set before losing 11-8 in the fifth game to a relieved Dolder, who had to pull out all the stops against one of the best defenders in the League. Their fourth opponents, Mid Cheshire, without Brian and Mike Johns, went down 6-0, which left last season's runners-up, with matches against Tameside, Oldham and champions Bolton to come in March.

At the same time, the Liverpool A team were in action at Accrington in division two, with Alice Howard, Dave Evans and Mikael Bellec, all playing for the first time for Liverpool at this level. They turned in a tremendous show, beating Trafford A 6-0, Halton A 5-1, Blackburn 6-0 and Lancaster & Morecambe 6-0, to top the division, with seven matches still to play.

The Liverpool men's team, Wilmott Cup finalists for the past two years in the National Team Championships, visit Leamington Spa in January, where they take on the hosts and Nottingham, who pipped Liverpool to the title two years ago. They need to finish top or runners-up in the group, to progress to the second stage.

In the J.M. Rose Bowl, the Liverpool women's team, national champions in 2003 and runners up to Wolverhampton last season,



also make the journey to Nottingham, where they face the hosts, plus Birmingham and Wirral, aiming to win at least two matches to qualify for the penultimate group of matches in March.

The Liverpool veteran team, winners of the Alce Brook Memorial Trophy in 2003, also play Leamington Spa and Nottingham on Saturday December 18th, the top two going on to the semi-final stages in February.

A total of nine leagues have entered the Pat Archdale Cup for veteran women. Liverpool, North Herts and Leicester, all travelling on December 18th to play former champions Wolverhampton.

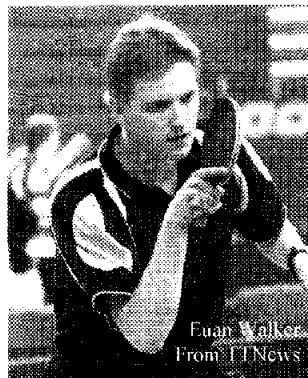
The draw for the five competitions has not been kind to Liverpool, yet again in the Carter Cup, our team has to travel. This is first time in many years that a Liverpool team has entered the junior boys competition and they face a stern test in Birmingham against the hosts plus Barnet and Milton Keynes, the winners and runner-up going through to the second of three qualifying group stages.

The saga of the Veteran team's fiasco of last season, continues to spill over into the 2004/05 campaign. After Liverpool had been officially declared as Premier Division champions, following Tameside's failure to fulfill the fixture in Liverpool on December 12th 2003. I have received a letter from Tameside (November) stating that they are not prepared to play us in the forthcoming match on

their table on 9th December, until we play the outstanding match!! Words fail me.

On the 75th anniversary of the City of Liverpool Open table tennis championships', supported by Liverpool City Council, the men's singles title went to a player from north of the border for the first time when Scotland international Euan Walker beat Poland's Michael Rogala, in the final. Walker, the runner up three years ago to Garth Herbert, notched wins over former Wirral man Mark Newns, England number 6 junior Adam Bleakley from Bury and Wales' Commonwealth Games player Stephen Jenkins from Pontypridd. His semi-final opponent was England number 2 junior Paul Drinkall, who led Walker by 2 games to 1 but the Scot recovered, taking the next two 11-9, 13-11. The unscoded Polish number 30, who speaks no English and is currently working

in Liverpool, cruised through the early rounds, but nearly came unstuck when he took five games to dispose of Devon's England number 4 junior Craig Bryant, 11-6, 5-11, 10-12, 11-8, 11-9 in the last eight, before meeting Italy's Fabio Mantegazza in the semi's, winning 11-9, 13-11, 13-15, 11-8. Drinkhall didn't leave empty handed though, the Cleveland youngster taking the junior boy's title against Liam Thomas (Wales), 11-6,

6-11, 11-7, 11-8, in the final. Scotland's Laura Rumgay dropped the first game to Clare Langford 11-5, but hit back to win the next three 11-8, 11-6, 11-4, to take the junior girls' crown.

In the women's Band one event, Bath Street's Clare Peers (nee News), beat Helen McCreary, (Wav. Lab) 11-6, 8-11, 11-7, 10-12, 11-6 in the last 16 before accounting for Clare Langford, also in five games in the next round, 11-6, 13-15, 11-5, 5-11, 11-9. Gemma Yarnley was her next victim, 8-11,

11-1, 11-8, 11-6, then taking the title with a comfortable straight games victory over Michele Cohen 11-5, 11-2, 11-6.

The women's open singles was predictably won by the 2000 champion and current England number one, Helen Lower from Staffordshire, beating Marketa Myskova (Devon), 11-8, 11-9, 11-13, 11-7, in the final.

England number one veteran John Hilton, was unfortunate to meet Italy's Roberto Giuntella in his first trip to the table in the veteran men's singles. The Italian then followed up

by disposing of Keith Williams 11-4, 11-4, 11-6, before dismissing Preston's Steve Turner 11-6, 11-6 4-11, 11-7 in the last semi's. His final opponent, Henry Medellin, ranked at 38 in England, enjoyed a walk over against the two times champion Nigel Eckersley, who withdrew through injury and although Medellin took the opening game 11-5, he succumbed to the Milanese man, 7, 7, 6 in the next three games.

## A few more items picked up by Don from a n old Digest of 50 years ago

I was reading a copy of the Digest, the sixth and final edition of the first season of publication, in April 1951, and an article by Bill Stamp regarding a 25th anniversary function on Wednesday May 9th. The League became the first private organisation to charter The 'Royal Iris', the ship having entered commission at the end of April, after it had been converted for cruising. The article stated that it had a capacity of 1000 and after leaving Liverpool at 7-30pm, called at Seacombe, 7-40, returning at 10-40. Tickets were 4/- and fish and chips and ices could be purchased on board, with a licensed bar and smoke room available together with air conditioned observation points. Dancing was to Reg Edwards and his orchestra - no surely not the Bath Street man. Incidentally, I heard recently, that Reg has had to take a break from playing, hope you recover as soon as possible Reg.

Players mentioned in the first ever Digest and still playing today, include Jack Davidson, Linacre (men's club) as they were then known. A quote from Jack could well be applicable today. "We have nine registered players and only one playing night each week. Our club

members are keen and will put up hard fight". Tough talk for those days Jack, but seriously, that maxim still prevails at the most genuine club and set of men in the League.

Jack Lambert told the Digest writer J.E. Neill, (who was the North Regional secretary from 1935 to 1939), we, English Electric, recently purchased a new Jaques table for £40. Not a cheap buy for that time. I still have a second hand Jaques for which I paid £25 not ten years ago!

Another interesting article relates to Aigburth Methodists who in their opening match, used A, B, N, & S Wilkinson. relegated last year, will be the same team members. CADWA 'D' (Andy McNabb, John O'Sullivan, Don Davics, Jack Highton and myself) are proper little angels. But we choose to play the match in the interests of fair play as they were in 3<sup>rd</sup> place in the league vying for promotion. YM fielded a strong side including George Smith. We lost the match 10-0 and got relegated. The YM won the division by 1 point. CADWA 'D' got relegated by 3 points. George signed for CADWA. Understandably 10-0 walkovers were submitted on card. It'll be a great shame if these games don't get rearranged and if this affects the end of season promotion list. By mid October, Bath Street 'G' were left to reflect that, due to no fault of their own had only played 1 match and even that was expunged!

But their opponents, Jeanette Hutchings and Jimmy Ambrose rallied to win their other singles and Jeanette and John Gillibrand combined for the doubles victory. Fate was not so kind in Bath Street 'G's away match to Maghull's 'E' team. Ron lost in 5 to both Banks', Steve & Jeff. Alan Chan got the better of Al Parker over 5 games. But worse was to come after the match was drawn 5-5. It was noticed that Bath Street's numbers 3&4 had played out of order. The revised score then being 3-7. It could have been worse, as only 2<sup>nd</sup> doubles and Barbara's 3v4 win over Ronnie Cockeroff were reversed. Al Parker's win over Ronnie, still stood as this would have been 3v4 rather than 4v4.

Andy McCourt and the rest of the Maghull 'E' lads had got off to a great start at Greenbank 'A', surviving 3 deciders to run out 10-0 victors. Wavertree Labour 'F' suffered exactly the same experience, losing 10-0 in their first game of the season to the other Maghull team. At least in the reverse fixture Wavertree's first doubles of Dave Murray & Dean Nickson enabled them to prevent another whitewash.

A completely changed Greenbank 'A' took on Wavertree 'F' in what could be deemed a bottom of the table clash. They asserted their supremacy over Wavertree Labour 'F' 8-2. Thanks to impeccable performances from Claire, Lynne, Anthony, and in the doubles.

With walkovers and post-ponements flying about, Greenbank 'A' are in danger of going over the 3 strikes and you're out line. Having players representing the country in the Olympics is a great honour, and it would be a shame if

this led to a failure to meet fixture obligations in this league. It may be that there is more to this, and that by adding an extra team, Greenbank have over extended themselves. If Greenbank 1<sup>st</sup> team are doing well in the 3<sup>rd</sup> division, then it will be Greenbank 'A' that are forced to withdraw.

With one team withdrawing we are now down to 18 matches per team. Still that's a better than prospect than last year. However, to have a 2<sup>nd</sup> team drop out of this division would be a great blow to the schedule and make the whole thing seem like a farce.

Even if this "play everyone 3 times" format is liked by the players, the lack of teams makes it poor alternative to having a full quotient of 12 teams. You have to remember that this division is oft regarded as being the home of players looking for a less competitive, more sociable match night, and also the nurturing ground for young talent. But with only 8 teams (now 7) it feels like a super league! It also feels like we

are the guinea pigs for a new format. I wonder if this new format will be grafted onto the elite of division 1 if successfully taken here? Mind you that might not be such a daft idea, as there is a bigger gap in ability between the top and middle of division one than there is between 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>! The top division is also said to be not attractive to the best players, so may be they will back a trimmed down higher quality premier division one? This will also ripple more teams down the league!

It's not for me to suggest such a thing in a divisional report, nor can I guess the effect of such moves. Obviously this is a big shake up we are talking about here and will be hard to stomach. So don't fret. It won't happen. In fact, forget I mentioned it.

Now don't let it spoil your Christmas by thinking about it too much.

### Young at 80



Myself, and the members of Aigburth Table Tennis Club thought Eric Young was the oldest in the Liverpool & District Table Tennis League, but on our recent visit to Linaere, we found that one of Linaere's founder members, Alec Davidson, was a bit older, but nevertheless, a great achievement to be still playing competitively.

Eric has been quite a sportsman in his time, he's done some boxing, ran for one of the top running clubs, Liverpool Harriers, an accomplished water skier, and top class Roller Skater, then for another branch to his sporting tree, decided to have a go at Table

Tennis. Eric was a late starter, and joined the Victoria Park Club in 1959, Victoria Park had originally been playing in the Sunday School and Church leagues, but were now playing in the Liverpool League South, under the guidance of Eddie Cameron, (League Secretary 1955-1994). Eric can remember those early coaching sessions from Eddie, and must have been encouraged by Victoria Park winning the J.Rumjahn Cup that season. In 1961 Eric left Victoria Park to join Wavertree Labour, where he helped the 'B' team win the W. Stamp Cup in 1963. Eric moved on to Sefton General Hospital, and then on to Liverpool Jewish in 1965, he won a Division 6 medal with them in 1998. Finally moving on to Aigburth in 1999, ending last season (2003-04) with what must have been one of his most satisfying wins, helping the 'A' team beat Div. 5 run-away leaders Wavertree Labour 'F', in the W. Stamp Cup Final.

So let's hope we have many more Joking years with him.

# The Paralympics 2004

Great Britain had a team of 166 athletes in Athens competing in 15 sports at the 2004 Paralympic Games, which took place from 17th to 28th September. In Sydney four years ago, the Paralympic team became one of the most successful British sporting teams of all time when it won 131 medals (41 gold, 43 silver, 47 bronze) and came second only to hosts Australia on the overall medal table.

**Neil Robinson** and **James Rawson** performed arguably one of the greatest come-backs in Paralympic table tennis history, to clinch a place in the Class 3 team final. Great Britain looked dead and buried in the fourth rubber of the semi-final against favourites France, when Jean Philippe Robin, the world number one, held eight match points over Robinson which would have clinched an overall 3-1 victory for the French. Incredibly an inspired Robinson fought back to take the match and the transformation was complete when Rawson won the deciding rubber. The British pair beat France 3-2 to face Korea in the final

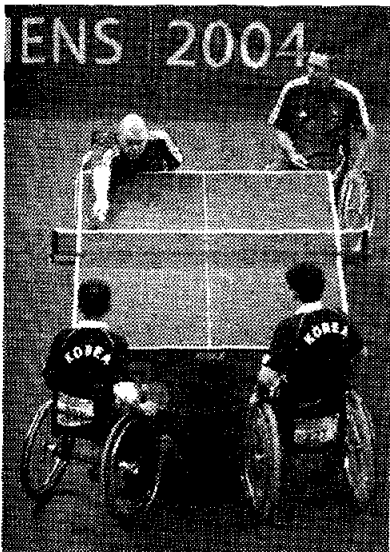
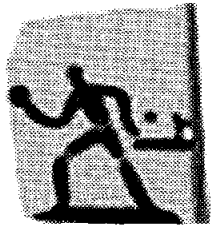
place at the Galatsi Olympic Hall, but the GB team couldn't repeat their world class turnaround over the French, going down 3-0 to the Koreans, but well done nevertheless.

The Class 5 team of **Arnie Chan** (Mansfield) and **Scott Robertson** (Deeside, Flintshire) failed to make it through to the knock-out rounds after losing 3-1 to Serbia & Montenegro. Robertson was involved in a marathon match with Ilija Djurasinovic in the first rubber with the Briton twice coming from behind to force a fifth game which Djurasinovic won. The second singles match was equally close. Chan fought back superbly from two games down against Zlatko Kesler, but couldn't quite finish the recovery as Kesler won the final game 11-7.

**Cathy Mitton** (Leeds) pulled off an excellent victory for Britain in the women's Class 1-3 team event, but it wasn't enough to stop Japan from securing an overall 3-1 match score. Due to the grouping of classes in this event Mitton and team-mate **Lynne Riding** (Preston), both C2 competitors, had to face C3 opponents which was always going to be a difficult step up in class. Mitton however made light work of Satoko Fujiwara in her first match, winning 11-6, 11-8, 11-5. This came after Riding had been beaten in the opener by Tomoko Fukuzawa. The pair then battled well in the doubles, particularly in a tight second game, but lost the match 3-0.

# COACHING

## ETTA Technical Manager

### *visits the North West*

*As part of the continuing support given to Table Tennis coaches throughout England, the ETTA Technical Manager, Steen Kyst Hansen delivered the annual North West coaches update seminar at Halton Table Tennis Centre on Saturday 6th November. The seminar was organised by Andrea Holt (North West Regional Development Officer) with a welcome from Karen Tonge the Halton Centre's Director and Chairperson.*

The seminar, entitled "Always looking to the future 2004-2005", outlined targets for the years 2004-2012. This was to build on the recent successes at the European Youth Championships, through to the Commonwealth Games in 2006, the world Championships in 2007, Beijing Olympics in 2008 going right through to hopefully the London Olympics in 2012. Questions were taken from the floor after each topic was delivered. This provided an interesting and stimulating discussion between Steen and the assembled coaches.



A short presentation of the recent European Youth Championships was given by Jill Parker using her laptop and digital projector. This showed video footage of some of the team matches for both boys and girls junior players.

Steen emphasised that although we are strong at Boys Cadet level, taking a silver medal at the Europeans, we still need to produce a steady stream of youngsters coming through to challenge the current players. We need 7 or 8 players of similar ability at both, Cadet and Junior levels, boys and girls to stimulate competition for places in the teams.

Costs of training these youngsters are quite considerable with some players going to Beijing two or three times a year to the Chinese National Table Tennis Centre whilst

others have attended other training events in Hungary and Sweden.

How do we make all this happen?

Steen outlined his ideas and where we, as coaches, come into the picture at grass roots level. We are all a team even though we are at the grass roots level and he is at the top with the England team. It takes about five years serious coaching and training to bring a youngster through to become a reasonable player, so coaching Juniors is a long term project.

After lunch we went to the tables to practice the shot training and routines to produce quality players. Steen outlined the role of the coach before and during the season at practice and at tournaments. Emphasis was made on the importance of footwork, movement, service, physical training and shot production. Later discussion related to a typical week at a training camp outlining good practice, warm up, technical warm up, first exercise and match play. Key points in every training session were covered, this applies to all levels of players from internationals to grass roots players.

I went away from the day with plenty of ideas and enthusiasm and I made a new pal in Ken Richardson from Lancaster, my practice partner. He was telling me at lunch how he coaches four times a week in High schools around Lancaster and Morecambe dealing with 100-110 youngsters each week. The local league has now grown from two divisions to four. That's what you call commitment! He looked so fit and well and is obviously thriving on it.

### **Have you ever thought about becoming a qualified umpire?**

There are many rewarding benefits to becoming an umpire. A lot of adult players take up umpiring to get a ring side view of some of the best matches in England or abroad, and find it a very rewarding way of giving something back to the game. Many also enjoy the social side of meeting new people at events throughout the county and further afield.

There is no age restriction to becoming an umpire. Starting with the Junior Umpire Award (JUA) with no minimum age limit, you can rapidly move up the umpiring ladder to become a Local Umpire (LU), County Umpire (CU), National Umpire (NU) or International Umpire (IU).

The Local Umpire qualification is a basic umpire test for those whose interest is initially in umpiring only at local level. It requires a sound knowledge of the Laws and basic scoring procedures. Contact Ken Arnson MBE for more details.
