EDITORIAL

A good indication to me that this season is slowly moving closer to the end than the start, is that I've just gone through the process of arranging venues for the divisional cup finals, and we now know all the teams who will be contesting each final, all club secretaries have been notified and hopefully this information will filter down to all league players, so why not pay a visit to any of the venues and watch a final.

A successful Stiga Junior 4 Star Tournament took place at the Greenbank Academy in January, with the winners as expected, but not without a fright for the top junior boy, full report on page 9 .

A big thanks to the helpers who collected, delivered, erected, dismantled, carted, and returned to the Police Club, all the required equipment.

The next big league tournament will be our own closed competition , (ENTRY FORM in this Digest), it will take place shortly after the season has finished, so hopefully a big end of season turnout will be on the cards, again those same helpers will be asked to help set the Tennis Centre up, with a few more to help, we hope! Please contact any of the Management Committee.

The big TV Table Tennis spectacular, The Super Circuit Masters is again being played at the Fairfield Concert Hall, London, the tournament takes place on Saturday 23rd July, with BBC TV showing an edited hour on Grandstand the following day. Jan Ove Waldner is the top name, but is only one of many taking part from a world who's who of professional table tennis, prize money of £40,000 to the winner.

TMS International (the marketing arm of the ITTF) has concluded an agreement with Eurosport international, the pan-European sports channel (available in 58 countries) to broadcast the World Championships, the Men's World Cup and the European



Championships. This agreement will run until 2009. This means that there will be more than 100 hours of table tennis on Eurosport over the next 5 years. The next events to be shown will be European Championships - Aarhus, Denmark - March 27th to April 4th 2005 World Championships - Shanghai, China - April 28th to May 5th 2005

The 5th Division is still a worry to the league, it can't be expected to survive as it is, and is extremely unfair to those who play in it, the players paying the same as every one else, but playing a lot fewer games because of reducing to 6 teams, and this after all the work the fixture Sec. put in forming a fixture list for an 8 team division. What can be done? A drastic suggestion is to do away with the 5th and spread all teams through 4 divisions, thus making the season longer, but once we lose a division, it would be difficult to resurrect that division (in today's climate) to attract new teams. Could we reduce the number of teams in each division in order to build up the fifth, 11 teams per division, (Div. 1 to 4) giving two

extra spare nights in a 12 team format, maybe have a bigger promotion and relegation between the 4th and 5th, 4up and 4 down. Why can't clubs' put forward new teams from the excessive number of players who appear on some club lists, but don't seem to get many games, (but only if they are prepared to honour the commitment to play, otherwise it's back to square one), I appreciate that availability of nights is a problem to some clubs. The foregoing are only from my thoughts.

It was disappointing to see (especially for the teams concerned) the number of teams who fell foul of the Cup Reg. 5 and had to be disqualified, various sound reasons were put forward in mitigation, but the rule was there, the surprising thing to me is that there hasn't been any requests from Clubs for a rule change, but in light of the circumstances, the Rules Committee have been asked to look at this particular Rule, and make recommendations in time for the 2005 AGM. (see League Sec's report pg.3)

Still a lot of teams playing short, and a number of walkovers. Fines, some clubs must be ruffling up quite an expense in fines, our fixture sec only follows the rules, but it seems in A.N. Other league, they deduct points instead of fines, maybe that would tend to focus players minds a bit more if their own team was penalised rather than the club; and a couple of walkovers earlier in the season could make the difference between promotion and relegation, something to think about.

'Whizz kid' of the computer, fixture secretary Trevor, has been keeping the averages up to date as he updates match information, so as an added interest, I've included the up to date player averages, but with limited space, have only used the top 15 players in each division, these are on the back 2 pages.

SECRETARY'S REPORT Mike Power

During the course of this season I have had several phone calls basically suggesting some of our rules are either over-the-top or need a dam good looking at. In particular, the rules governing a player's eligibility for cup competitions where several teams have been thrown out this season for playing an ineligible player. I have reminded those people that they can propose rule amendments for inclusion on the agenda at the AGM. I have also stated that if they need any assistance in putting the proposal together, I will always help. The final date for any proposal is Saturday 26th February. At the time of writing there are only 8 days to go before this cut-off point is reached and I have to date received the grand total of zero proposed amendments! There is little doubt in my mind that you are reading this 'post 26th February', and I expect we will still have no new proposals on the table! There is no point complaining about the rules to the MC as you, the clubs, have put the rules together over the years. The MC only enforces the rules **you have made** whether originally proposed by the MC or proposed by a club.

The Management Committee are moving towards arranging Public Liability insurance, not only for the MC members and League events, but also for all registered clubs within the League however the earliest this **MAY** be available is September/October 2005. This will hopefully be via the ETTA block policy. If and when this happens the onus will still be on each club to ensure the cover this policy provides satisfies their requirements as under current legislation the League are not authorised to advise you. This cover will obviously come at a price but we do not expect it to be an extortionate amount and will be discussed at the next AGM at the end of May 2005. I would remind all



club secretaries that it is incumbent on you all to ensure you have adequate insurance protection against the inevitable accident. In this litigious society it is vital your club, and each individual, be it one of your own members or a visitor, is covered. You may say that no-one has ever sued us in the past, well I would remind you that Everton have never played in the Champions League either! (Hopefully they never will).

After 10 years in the wilderness Mal McEvoy is back and playing for Fords. After an even longer break, Clive Stretle is also back, also with Fords. It appears that Tim Weardon is assembling quite a squad and seems certain to overcome the 20 points deduction their first team suffered at the beginning of the season and avoid the possibility of relegation. If this team stays together next season with Kevin Dolder at the helm they could be challenging for honours. It appears this season as though Keith Williams and Co. will win another first division championship, this time with Waterloo with only Liverpool YMCA having any realistic chance of catching them. (How many clubs has Keith won the first division with?) It also looks likely that next season the first division will incorporate 3 teams from Liverpool YMCA.

The MC's decision at the beginning of the season to place Greenbank into the 3rd division looks to have been the correct one, as they appear to be well on their way to the 2nd already. I don't know what's going to happen to the 5th division next season. With only 6 teams left it looks as though the writing is on the wall. Any suggestions are always welcome.

Finally, lets try and make sure there are no walkovers given between now and the end of the season. I have commented before that this always seems to happen but it has an extremely annoying affect. Simply by not playing a match, maybe because you are a mid-table side and feel there is nothing at stake, you inadvertently give someone a lifeline and help them to avoid relegation. The problem is of course that someone else gets relegated instead and after battling hard all season this becomes a bitter pill to swallow. It can obviously have the same affect at the top of a division as well. So come on Club Sec's, lets make sure this doesn't happen again. Look forward to seeing you all at the 'Closed', even the Evertonians.

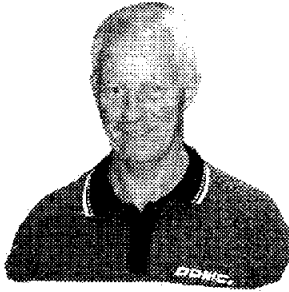
The League's chances of collecting multiple pieces of silverware in the Lancashire & Cheshire League, receded in recent weeks due to a number of disappointing performances. The men look to have the best chance of clinching a major title, and with just one match to play, boast a 100% record, requiring a draw in our last match, to regain the title. With premier division matches staged over the weekend, we were due to play three matches. But with Oldham and Tameside's records' being expunged due to breaking regulations', Bolton, lying next to bottom, who have only one win from four matches, stand in our way, a year after beating us 4-2 when a draw would have meant we retained the title.

The Ladies' division was pruned down to only five teams' with the eventual winners coming from either Liverpool or reigning champions Wirral. The peninsular league team won their first three matches 6-4, 10-0 and 10-0, while our girls' were given 10-0 walkovers by Mid Cheshire and Oldham. Our 'next' match was away to Wirral, and we had the knowledge of knowing we could lose 6-4 and still regain the title if we could limit Manchester to just two sets in our final match. Alice Howard, together with Cherith and Sylvia Graham though, were thrashed 8-2 which, has landed the trophy on the other side of the river for the fourth time in seven years years. The title has remained on Merseyside every year since 1988 apart from Manchester's two triumphs in the middle 1990's. Well done Clare, Terri-Anne, Gemma and Clare Langford.

After winning the J.M. Rose Bowl two seasons ago and finishing as runners-up last year, we were drawn at Nottingham together with Birmingham and Wirral. On the same day, Alice Howard was representing Lancashire and Cherith Graham was playing in the University doubles championships. The hosts tried to obtain a change of date since two of her players' were also involved in county play, but the national organiser refused and with Brenda Buoeu unfit, it left us with little option but to withdraw. Very unsatisfactory.

The veteran 1st team suffered this term with raising the strongest team which may cost us the title, won for the past four years.

However, with Tameside refusing to play the first team in December, using the unplayed match from December 2003, as the reason, (see Digest No. 1) for the background. Since then though, they have been dismissed from the competition for using a banned player in a league match and subsequently, repeated the act by using another banned player, which makes their refusal



to play us, academic. In conclusion, if that's the correct word to use, they have appealed against the decision!! A calamitous 9-1 defeat at Bath Street by Liverpool Business Houses may have ended our chance of retaining our crown but the less I say about this debacle the better.

The open division A division 2 team, continued their impressive form in the second of three weekend stints, Omid Khaiyat, Keith Bird and Mikael Bellec, remained unbeaten at Hyndburn, the venue having been changed at the last minute from Bolton. This while I was in Australia, could have caused a mix up since the players' were set up with the map to Bolton. Mike Power handled the issue and only he knows the problems attached to this and other aspects of inter-city play, where things change almost by the hour.

Liverpool Veterans made it through to the National Finals with a superb performance at Matlock in the Alec Brook Memorial Trophy.

The hosts, who suffered a crushing 5-1 defeat to Northumbria, were routed 5-0 by the Liverpool team of Chris Ford, Keith Williams and John Rankin.

With Slough withdrawing late on, Liverpool then edged a tight encounter with Northumbria to win a place in the May Derby Final.

Chris Fords straight games win over John Williamson opened the match, but Northumbria forged a 2-1 lead, Dave Godbold and Geoff Salter recording victories over Rankin and Williams respectively. The fourth set was the turning point of the match when Ford completely outplayed England No. 11 Godbold, beating him 11-8, 11-8, 11-7, to level matters. Williams made it 3-2 against Williamson, before Salter kept his side in it against Rankin. The two top players then faced each other, and Williams ranked at 6, bounced back from losing the first game to clinch the set with a 13-11 thriller in the final game. Ford then saw off double winner Salter in straight games to clinch the match by 5-3.

The Maghull Club will been missing one of their regular players for a while, Huyton GP of 35 years, Dr. Naresh Tagore, of the Princess Drive Medical Centre, flew out to Malasia to help with the many medical problems from the recent Tsunami disaster, he will be based in a hospital on the island of Thinadhoo, still inundated with the injured from the disaster, I'm sure we all wish him well, and a safe return. APPEALS PANEL

BOARD of APPEAL MEETING 16th February 2005

The APPEALS PANEL, namely, Brian Leeson, Jack Lambert and Dave Graham.

The Panel decided unanimously to uphold CADWA's appeal against the Management Committee's decision to declare void the three singles games in the CADWA v M/Side Police (Div.1) match, in which an alleged illegal bat was to be used by a CADWA player, the Panel decided that the three un-played games should be awarded to CADWA for the following reason.

An individual player, or players, cannot refuse to play, for whatever reason, if an opponent is there willing and waiting to play. When there is no qualified official appointed, no one player or players can make that decision. A complaint in **writing** to the Organising Secretary / Management Committee should be made within the specified time limit as per rule (*Management Rule 3 page 4*) and the match card returned unsigned. The opponent (s) must be informed of the proposed action.

To sum up, all sets and games must be played and complaints registered later in the correct way.

To give a bit of background for this appeal to the readers, a member of the Police team complained about the surface of the bat of a CADWA player, which although a perfectly legal rubber; in the opinion of the Police player, the rubber had two alleged creases in it as like a "back to front" Nike tick, and that the surface on the blade was not consistent. The CADWA player pointed out that he "neither sought nor obtained any advantage from the creases, but that it is very difficult to glue these particular sheets on without causing bubbles", so the three games involving this bat weren't played. At the last Management Committee meeting it was decided that in view of the circumstances surrounding this issue, the 3 singles matches involved be declared void, and the Clubs concerned be advised of the procedure they should follow should such circumstances arise at any future match. CADWA appealed against this decision.

As the appeal panel point out, unless there is a "qualified" umpire to check the bat no one can decide if the bat is illegal or not, the games must be played, as many facts as possible should be recorded, then an official written complaint made.

On looking through the various rules on Bats / Rackets, there isn't a lot of help on this regards condition of rubber, the ETTA rule does go somewhat, but who's to judge weeks after the event. Our own rules only ask for the ITTF Logo as well as the red / black sides, I remember many years ago I was cutting a new sheet of rubber,

I laid it out, marked around the bat, cut it out, turned it over to glue to the blade, and yes, the logo was at the top of the bat, what a waste, had to get a new rubber, but on reflection now, that logo was "near the edge of the striking surface" even though it was the wrong end of the bat, could I have saved myself £20 !, wishful thinking, but could a good barrister get round that one, gladly commonsense prevails.

ETTA & ITTF

2.4.7 Slight deviations from continuity of surface or uniformity of colour due to accidental damage or wear may be allowed provided that they do not significantly change the characteristics of the surface.

2.4.8 At the start of a match and whenever he changes his racket during a match a player shall show his opponent and the umpire the racket he is about to use and shall allow them to examine it.

RACKET

The covering material on a side of the blade used for striking the ball shall be of a brand and type currently authorized by the ITTF and shall be attached to the blade in such a way that the trademark and ITTF logo are clearly visible near the edge of the striking surface. The surface of one side of the racket shall be bright red and the surface of the other side shall be black, whether or not both sides are used for striking the ball

Arranging a date for our Closed is never easy due to venue availability a packed Calendar and a number of our players being involved in various events and this season it has proved more difficult than ever. After much heart searching the league came up with the best possible date only to find the venue was not available. The next best possible date available being April 24 the Management committee were left with no option other than to accept this even though it clashed with an ETTA Grand Prix. The alternative would have meant moving to May and take us way past our end of season matches. Those members who enter Grand Prix tournaments will now have to decide which event they will support and hopefully they will support their league.

Good and bad news on the health front Frank Lacey suffered a heart attack at Christmas and spent the festive period in hospital. He is now recovering and doing well. The good news being that Dave Roberts also spent part of the festive period in hospital having been admitted on 29 December to have two knee replacements. He is out and he tells me he is making good progress and hoping to be back playing next season. Dave has his sights set not only on a return to league play but also to get back to winning ways and in particular against players he used to beat but found himself losing to when his mobility worsened forcing him to eventually stop playing. Good to hear Bill Clayton is back playing after his accident when he fell and broke a bone in his ankle. Although still not fully fit his return ensured his team reached the semi final of the Frank Murphy cup. Billy (Limp Along) Clayton getting enough points in the final set v Bob Edwards to give his team a 6 point win.

Another piece of good news is the return to Liverpool of Tom



(Big backhand) Purcell who will be back playing with the Police next season and again become a fully home-based qualified umpire. During his absence absent Tom has qualified as an International Umpire.

A problem concerning the legality of a racket occurred in a 1st division match resulting in several matches not being played and leaving the Management Committee to try and resolve the issue culminated in a club appealing against the decision. Nothing wrong with that but I find it surprising that players will take issue over the legality of a racket and yet totally ignore illegal serving. Stan Clarke often comments when this subject comes up that some offenders don't comply with the previous service rule let alone the current requirements. No one should be offended when serving if they are asked to throw the ball up the required minimum height of 16cm or 6 inches as the player is often unaware that they have not done so and often it will be accidental. The reason why many will not make such a request and why illegal servers get away with it is because the worst offenders invariably take umbrage and this creates bad feelings and generally ruins the evening.

All players should be prepared when umpiring and unhappy with a

player's service action to tell them what the problem is and request they comply with the basic requirements i.e. throw the ball up at least 16cms. don't throw it blatantly backwards and don't serve straight off their palm. This need not be accompanied by faulting the player and if everyone adopted this friendly approach illegal serving would lessen and eventually be eliminated. The players concerned know who they are but until we all start pointing it out to them they won't see any need to change. I am sure that at times I don't throw it high enough not because I am trying to gain any advantage but because I am concentrating on other aspects of the game and all it needs is for someone to point this out. If you deliberately and knowingly foul serve then you are cheating, surely no one wants to be known as a cheat?

Nominations for the re-election of ETTA Chairman, Deputy Chairman (I once referred to this position as Vice Chairman and was rebuked by the incumbent) and Treasurer have closed and the present holders re-elected unopposed but you can be assured that in 2 years time they will be opposed by the Old Guard and not without good cause as the welter of fine words and promises has so far produced little of notice and many will still be bemoaning the loss of 21 up.

I made reference to PESCCCL in the previous issue and make no apologies for returning to this subject. Halton and St Helens (a town without a table tennis league) each now have an ETTA Community coach funded via PESCCCL working 25 hours a week and going into schools etc to promote table tennis and no doubt there already large squad of young players will multiply. What then is the future for table tennis in Liverpool, a major city boasting one of the strongest leagues in the North West but having only two home

grown junior players in its league with the majority of its players showing total disinterest in getting involved in promoting their sport and club venues disappearing on a regular basis. A cynic would say there is no future for table tennis in our city unless we all wake up and start getting involved.

Couple of interesting items floating round, firstly our National councillors have given their provisional blessing to the Individual Player Registration scheme even though no positive information on what it is going to cost players or what impact financially it will have on our sport is available. I have to say that I am a supporter of the IPRS but I am also concerned as to the lack of financial information available to enable it to be fully assessed. Leagues have virtually no information but will hold the key to its acceptance or rejection.

Why so, because if the proposal to amend the current voting procedures is carried at the ETTA Annual Meeting then National Councillors who support IPR and who currently hold the bulk of voting rights will lose their voting

strength if changes to the voting procedure are carried. I wonder how many National Councillors tested the water in their County before voting for IPR to go on the AGM Agenda?

Why do I ask? Because I have just been reading about this same proposal for amateur athletics and the concerns being raised about it with some commenting that it could be the kiss of death for athletics rather than its saviour.

So we move to the next step. finance. With much trumpeting the ETTA have proudly announced the Sport England funding for the next few years and amongst the welter of words I note there is reference to grassroots. Now your version of grassroots will no doubt be local level but if there is anyone out there who thinks any of this funding will ever get down to the real grassroots level then they are living in cloud cuckoo land.

So what is the connection for all this? Quite simply our sport along with many others is funded mainly by Sport England or in some cases UK sport and it is the faceless wonders of Sport England and UK Sport who call

the tune and tell Associations such as ours not only how they think an Association should operate and conduct its affairs but also what it can or cannot do and if they don't toe the line then they get no funding. The government appoints these faceless people and this allows our elected MP's to wash their hands of funding sport by passing this responsibility to an un-elected Body.

Yes, I would agree that lottery funding has brought many improvements such as Regional Development Officers, additional posts within the ETTA and the availability of grants. But it comes at a price and that price is freedom to decide how you operate. The saying the hand that rocks the cradle rules the world can be amended to read the hand that holds the purse strings rules sport.

You might be all in favour of others dictating how your sport should conduct itself but remember that nothing is for nothing and what they give grudgingly with one hand they can speedily remove without explanation with the other and there is no right of appeal. Democracy has no place when money is involved.

Club / League Welfare Officers

The L&DTTL has received correspondence from the ETTA requesting that Nationally every Club (or League) nominate a Club / League Welfare Officer to be the local Child Protection point of contact.

In November 2004 the ETTA began the process of asking Clubs and /or Leagues to appoint welfare officers. These volunteers will be the local point of contact for any child protection issues, although they will have, other than in an emergency situation, a reporting role ensuring that the ETTA's Child Protection Officer is kept informed of any reported suspicions relating to child abuse. These officers will never be put in the position of deciding whether or not abuse is taking place. In addition they will provide a local network for the dissemination of information to our members. A requirement of the local post would be attendance at tournaments run by the L&DTTL.

It is anticipated that the role should take no more than 1-2 hours maximum per week.

During 2005 the ETTA's Child Protection Officer will be holding a number of 2 hour evening workshops with welfare officers looking at the ETTA's processes and procedures relating to child protection. The nominated person would receive an induction pack with information to assist him / her in their roll.

The Club/League Welfare Officer is **NOT** expected to make judgements on whether child abuse has or has not taken place but to ensure that either the appropriate authorities or the ETTA's National Equity and Child Protection Officer are informed of any suspicions as soon as possible. The Club/League Welfare Officer will be expected to advise the ETTA's National Equity and Child Protection Officer of any such reports and any local action taken

LIVERPOOL STIGA 4 STAR JUNIOR TOURNAMENT 2005

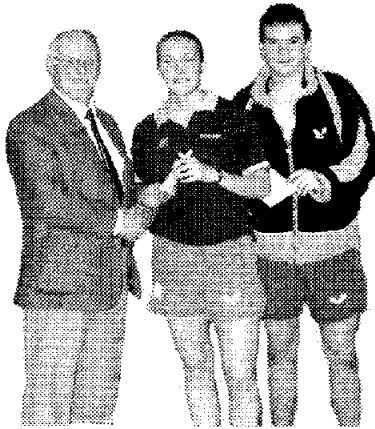
held at THE GREENBANK ACADEMY 8th/9th, JAN.

Paul Drinkhall, 15, the England number one Junior and top seed in the Stiga Liverpool Junior 4 Star Open, generously supported by Liverpool City Council, swept aside all opposition, taking both the Cadet and Junior boys' singles titles. The Cleveland youngster didn't drop a game in the Cadet event, Bath Street's Jamie Hewitt being his first victim, 11-4, 11-2, 11-4. Not until he faced Scotland's Craig Howieson, did he lose more than eight points, taking the title and a £100 cheque with an 11-4, 12-10, 12-10 final victory.

Drinkhall, England's match winning hero in the recent European League encounter with The Netherlands, repeated the feat in the Junior Boys' singles, accounting for Howieson in the second round, 11-5, 11-5, 11-8, after the Scot had taken the first game. He didn't have it all his own way though in the last eight, Damien Nicholls (Shropshire) taking a 2-1 lead before losing 12-10, 8-11, 11-4, 4-11, 5-11. The semi-final was an up and down affair. Drinkhall overcoming David Meads 11-8, 11-5, 10-12, 11-1, 12-10 to qualify for a final clash with Surrey's Darius Knight. The England's number two junior, sailed into the last four without dropping a game which left him facing Kenny Lindsay, who had also kept a clean sheet up to that stage. This included an 11-7, 11-7, 13-11, victory over Tom Bray (Bootle JC). Knight took the first game, lost the next 11-5, won the third 11-9, before dropping the fourth 10-12. It was neck and neck in the decider but the youngster from the Kingdom of Fife, edged home 12-10 for a famous victory.

The final was a tense affair, Drinkhall, not in his best form, nevertheless, did enough to take the title, winning 11-9, 11-8, 11-6. Just out of interest, this title was previously won by such greats as Bonnie Casofsky, Ken Stanley, Geoff Pullar, Denis Neale, Chester Barnes, Alan Hydes, Trevor Taylor, Jimmy Walker, Donald Parker, Desmond Douglas, Mike Johns and the last Liverpool League player to claim the title, Peter Flint in 1980.

Warwickshire's Kelly Sibley eased her way through the Junior Girls' singles event, her only blip coming in her semi-final clash with Sarah Perks (Nottingham), dropping the opening game 11-7, before recovering to win 11-4, 11-6, 12-10. This earned the England senior number 4, a final clash with Scotland's Rebecca Russell, who trailed 2-1 in the

quarters' to Susie Steeples (Lincs') but went on to oust Wirral's Sophie Byron 12-10, 11-9, 11-1, in the semi's. Miss Sibley, took the first game 11-7 and despite dropping the next 11-9, comfortably disposed of the Scottish lass, 11-3, 11-5, to lift the trophy and a cheque for £100.

Surrey's Wing-Yung Chan, justified his top seeding position in the Junior Band One singles, dropping just one game in the event to overcome Stewart Mudie (Lincolnshire) in the final, 11-8, 11-6, 11-6, while the Junior Girls' singles was won

by Caroline Hallows (Cheshire), the second seed defeating Scottish top seed Corinna Whitaker, 16-14, 11-7, 11-8 in the final. Wirral's Jordyn Layfield led Martha Travis by 2 games to 1 in the quarter finals before succumbing 8-11, 10-12, 10-12.

Miss Hallows also reached the final of the Cadet Girls' singles but after disposing of fourth seed Rebecca Russell in the last four, bowed out to top seed Emma Vickers (Derbyshire) 5-11, 12-10, 7-11, 5-11.

Jamie Hewitt was the only Liverpool League player to make the main draw in the Cadet Band One singles, where he faced top seed Stewart Mudie. Although finishing second to the Lincolnshire boy to qualify for the first round, the Bath Street youngster departed via an 8-11, 11-5, 9-11, 14-12, 8-11 reversal to Tom Maynard. Mudie however, didn't drop a game en-route to the final where he overcame Damien Piper (Yorkshire), 11-8, 11-5, 12-10.

Another Warwickshire player taking a title was top seed Rachel Pilgrim in the Cadet Girls' singles, her progress couldn't be halted by Lucy Davidson, Catherine Hayes or second seed Lancashire's Reena Ardeshana, who despite taking the first game in the final, lost the next three games 9-11, 6-11, 6-11.

Ken wants a rule to cover "regular non appearances which enable clubs to keep players ranked lower than they should be" *(have we sorted that one out).*

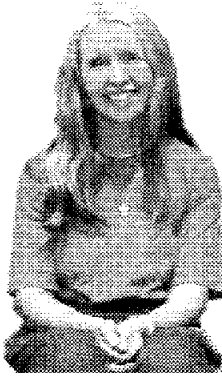

DIVISION 4 STAN CLARKE

What a competitive division this is only 44 points separate the leaders and the bottom team and only eight points between second and eight place, I don't think I have ever seen a closer battle in my forty odd years of playing in Liverpool.

Bootle Y.M.C.A. "A" have quietly drawn twelve points clear of the second place team and have a match in hand, the transfer of Len Dyson from Merseyside Police has really strengthened the team, pushing Bert Rivers down to number two, Arthur Garnett to three with Peter Williams, Mike Hughes and Jim Goddes fighting for the fourth spot, they are a formidable combination at this level and seem almost certain to be playing in the third division next season as champions of the fourth division.



The other promotion place is still very much up for grabs, with any one from seven teams in a position to put together a run of wins to pull away from the pack, realistically I think second spot will be contested by Bath St. "E", Marconi "B" and Wavertree Labour "C", but that will depend on the ability of Marconi to regularly turn out their strongest team.

with so many of their players working shifts that regularly clash with their fixtures you can never be sure just which team will turn out. For example when we played Marconi, Bobby Bell was at number four, the following week he was playing at number one, quite a difference. Bath St. "E" have forced themselves into second place at the time of writing, although they are level on points with Marconi and just two points ahead of Wavertree Labour "D" for whom Tony Mitchell is enjoying a fine season, not to mention Steve Perry who seems to be causing some problems at the bottom of the order, his "Style" is different to say the least, but he does have the ability to bamboozle his opponents, or is it just that they are expecting to see snow on the ball when it finally gets to the table?

Maghull "C" are proving a bit of an embarrassment to their "B" team sitting in fifth place, four places above their higher ranked colleagues, with twelve more points, both having played fourteen matches, although in truth there is little to choose between the two teams on paper and which should be the stronger of the two is arguable.

In sixth place are Wavertree Labour "C" with 73 points from thirteen matches, they have a postponed match to play against their "E" team and a similar result to the last time the two met will propel the "C" team into second place. A special mention for Tom Creevy, the baby of the side, who has been promoted to number two in the team, and is beginning to produce some very good wins with his aggressive top spin style. Wavertree Labour "E" are only two points adrift of the "C" team and in John Rowan have one of the more dangerous players in the division, now, rightfully playing at number one in the team, with Eric Spencer dropping down to the fourth place, he can produce tremendous hitting from either wing and his only problem seems to be a lack of self confidence, but be warned this team of bus drivers are a force to be reckoned with, although they will be hampered by the absence of Ian Woods for some weeks due to an injury.

Linacre are enjoying their best season for some years, the signing of Harry Nelson, playing at number two, behind Harry Reeve has strengthened the Crosby side, moving Jack Davidson down to number three, and as a consequence they are still in a position from where they can push into a much higher position in the division in the later stage of the season. Next we have the enigma of Maghull "B" in ninth place, one of the under-performing teams in the division, they do seem to have problems turning out their strongest team on a regular basis, it seems to be a case of any four from six or seven, a problem

that also seems to invade Harold House "B" who seem to have a cast of thousands to choose from, but seldom seem to turn out their strongest team on a regular basis.

And finally we have the two Aigburth teams, with the "A" team two points above the first team who are in bottom place, it would seem that the youth policy is paying off for the "A" team as both Lee Proffitt and Ian Laird are consistently producing wins, it would be a shame to lose either of these teams to the bottom division, but at the moment it looks as though they may well both be relegated as it is hard to see how they can produce the necessary wins to overtake Harold House and Maghull "B".

There have been some notable individual wins to date, Harry Reeve beating both Ted Cramsie and Karen Gibson for Linacre against Bath St. "E" and in the same match Chris Foley beating Jack Davidson. Graham Rollinson of Aigburth beat Dave McMahon and Bill Salter of Maghull "B", John Rowan W.L. "E" beat Bert Rivers and Mike Hughes of Bootle Y.M.C.A. in a 5/5 drawn match. Lee Proffitt, Aigburth "A" beat Russell Thornton and Bobby Bell of Marconi "B". In week eight Ian Laird, playing as a reserve for the Aigburth first team beat Gary Abrams and Dave Cohen, and Lee Proffitt beat Stan Clarke and Stephanie Howard and Ian Laird beat Tom Creevy for Aigburth "A" against Wav.Lab. "C". Phil Christie beat Ted Cramsie and Cieran McAleese of Bath St. "E", against Cieran Phil trailed 10/2 in the fifth game but pulled back to win 15/13, who said you can't get back after a bad start with 11 up.

In week 10 Tom Creevy beat Ray Jones and Carl Anderson and Stan Clarke beat Graham Rollinson and Eric Wood then the two paired up to beat to beat Eric Wood and Ray Jones in the doubles as Wav.Lab. "C" just scrapped home 6/4 against Aigburth. In an 8/2 thrashing by Wav.Lab. "E" Ted Cramsie won the only singles match for Bath St. "E" against Eric Spencer, and then teamed up with Graham Oakes to win in his doubles game. In the match between Bootle Y.M.C.A. and Maghull "B" Dave McMahon beat Arthur Garnett and Harry McGinley beat Mike Hughes as the Bootle team roared to an 8/2 victory. In the match between Wav.Lab. "D" and Marconi "B" Tony Mitchell beat Ted Gilmour and Bobby Bell, Andy Baird beat Ted Gilmour and Russell Thornton and Gordon Langshaw and Steve Pory both beat ex team mate Ken Roberts in a 7/3 victory for Wavertree, whilst Lee Proffitt was the only success for Aigburth "A" against Linacre, beating Harry Nelson and Ken Ainsworth. In week eight Aigburth played Harold House "B", with Harold House turning out Paul Shaw, who won his two sets. Graham Rollinson made him work his socks off taking the second game 26/24, yes they were playing 11 up.

In week 11, Linacre played Wavertree Labour "C" with Stephanie Howard proving the most successful player for Wavertree, beating Jack Davidson and Peter Barton, Ken Armonson lost both of his sets against Harry Reeve and Jack Davidson in five, having lost the first game against Harry 1/11 Ken fought back to win the next two but Harry proved to be too strong, taking the final two games, Stephanie continued her good work by showing Bill the way in their doubles against Harry Nelson

and Peter Barton, still a good win for Linacre. Aigburth "A" lost 3/7 against Maghull "C" but a good win for Derek Traynor against Brian Gregory and a double for Ian Laird beating Steve McGanity and Wilf Gibson. In the match between Wavertree Labour "E" and Maghull "B" John Rowan suffered a rare defeat at the hands of Dave McMahon, Bill Salter and Harry McGanity beating Ian Woods and Eric Spencer respectively, but a treble for Kevin O'Hanlon was enough to give Wavertree the win. Maghull "B" drew with Wavertree Labour "D" thanks mainly from a double from reserve Dave Goulding and a splendid, though close win for Andy Bird against Dave McMahon which was decided 13/11 for the Wavertree man in the fifth game. Aigburth produced a rare win against Linacre, Eric Wood and Ray Jones the heroes with double wins for in the singles, then pairing up to beat Harry Nelson and Peter Barton in the doubles, add a win for Graham Rollinson against Harry Nelson and Aigburth ran out winners 6/4. Harold House "B" held Wavertree Labour "E" to a draw thanks mainly to an undefeated night for John Hughes who beat John Rowan and Kevin O'Hanlon, then to rub salt in the wound teamed up with Paul Morgan to beat John and Kevin in the doubles. There are only 2 things in doubt in this division. Don Davies too had that seesaw feeling, losing his first and last game against Janette 9-11. Student Ian Ambrose (Jimmy's lad) was around to bag a brace, coming from 2-0 down against myself, and holding his nerve in a tense 5 game v Don. Andy & I found John & Janette on inspired form to again win a 5 game.

The last week in November and first week in December, featured 3 intra club matches. Andy won that set and teamed up with Steve in the 1st doubles to record a very good win over Ron & Chris Blackburn, again in 5. This put the visitors 2-1 up in sets, and things were looking good. John & Janette stumbled in their doubles from 2-0 up to eventually win 11-9 in the 5th over Dave & Norman. Dave had already
